she had worn last Friday and at one time re-enacted part of her alleged struggle with Pantages. Gordon was the first witness to follow Miss Pringle, who was on the stand most of yesterday and today.

He said he ran to the Mezzanine floor of the theatre building in which Pantages' office is lo-cated when he heard a woman's screams. "I saw a woman's hand protruding from the door of the little room," he said, "and I heard screams coming from the inside. I pushed the door open. The girl ran out and I looked in the room and saw Pantages. When a man rushed past me—a young man in a blue suit. He rushed past me and picked Pan-tages up off the floor. Then the young man slammed the door."

Mystery Girl Enters Into Case

"Now did you notice a girl around there?" the prosecutor asked.

"Yes, I noticed a girl in back of me. The Pringle girl was screaming, and Mr. Pantages said 'Hush, close the door.'"

"I pushed the door open with my hand. The Pringle girl was screaming 'Help! Help! Save me!'"

Mr. Pantages kept saying 'Keep quiet. Close the door!'"

Gordon testified that a few min-utes later Pantages rushed out of the office and, accompanied by the young man in blue, entered another room of the suite of of-fices. He was unable to identify either the "man in blue" or the young woman who he said was trying to close the door.

Miss Pringle came back to the offices shortly with other men who had heard her screams. Gor-don said, and went with them into the room in which Pantages had disappeared, where she pointed her finger at him and cried:

"There is a beast! Don't let him get away!"

way grade up to the Hogg pass route.

Reher said he thought his crew would be through with its work within 60 days. Maps and other topographical information from the survey will be drawn this winter and when completed will fur-nish valuable information for road planning.

While the larger part of the road program will run through federal government timber, the land is located in Linn county. The Marion county court deemed it advisable to make its appropri-ation for the survey because the road, if completed, would link up the Mills-City Detroit road with a through route to the eastern Oregon country.

Spokane Sungod Goes Down Columbia Valley Upon Start of Jaunt

the trans-continental refueling flight of Nick Mamer and Art Walker, were not uneasy over re-ports that he had not been sighted at Portland an hour and fifteen minutes past his scheduled arriv-ing time.

"Mamer planned to fly over Portland at 5,000 feet and then immediately climbing to 10,000 feet to miss the mountains to the south," they said. "If the sky was hazy he could easily have been missed."

If a report from the fliers is not received by dawn, said Cap-tain Warren Wadsworth, acting commander of the 41st division air service unit of the Washing-ton national guard, a squadron of military planes will leave here to search for them.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 15—(AP)—Attendants at Boeing field, Medford, told the Associ-ated Press tonight that Nick Mam-er and Art Walker had not flown over their field. They declared they were not uneasy since the fliers might have been delayed.

Later reports from Boeing field at Medford said that a plane, pre-sumably Mamer's, might have passed far to the east of that city. Field attendants said they thought they heard a drone similar to that of an airplane motor shortly be-fore midnight.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 15—(AP)—N. B. Mamer and Art Walker hopped off at 5:58:10 p. m. Pacific time here today, head-ing their orange seaplane "Spo-kane Sungod" into the western sunset as they began their Spo-kane-San Francisco-New York-Spokane endurance flight.

The big ship coughed, its mo-tor roared into life and it raced down the field, carrying nearly 6,000 pounds as it thrummed into the merging horizon.

Namer hopes to set a new goal for loaded commercial planes by making a trans-continental round trip refueling flight, which will take him over the following cit-ies: Portland, Medford, Oregon; San Francisco, Oakland, Califor-nia, Reno, Nev., Salt Lake City.
