Harvest of Heaviest Yield in Years Keeps Central Howell Busy

The wheat is all yielding close to 40 bushels an acre and all the way to 50 bushels and more. The opinion is advanced by some that the freezing weather last winter was a blessing in disguise just thinning the wheat enough to insure a good yield.

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Silverton Dairymen Much Interested in Dairy Survey

SILVERTON, Aug. 16.—Silverton dairymen express themselves as greatly interested in the dairy survey to be made in Oregon.

According to the information which reached Silverton the survey will extend over a period of two years and will involve 500 dairymen in the state. The work will be carried on by the Oregon Agricultural experiment station with federal funds made available under the Purnell act.

Cost of dairy farm production

In different regions and on various types of dairy farms and means of reducing these costs so that increasing competition can be met successfully will be studied in this survey. It is understood here that the records from which the data will be obtained will be taken from 300 Willamette valley, 100 coast region and 100 eastern Oregon dairy farms. The study will cover the years 1929 and 1930. According to word reaching here the actual field work will begin in the very near future.

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INSTALLATION OF MOTORS IS PUSHED

Rapid progress is being made on the installation of electric motors at the C. K. Spaulding Logging company sawmill in Salem.

Fourteen motors are in use, and today the first of the three steam boilers which are to be eliminated, will be retired from service.

The program, which will be completed in about 30 days according to officials of the company, involves the installation of 48 motors. One boiler will be retained to supply steam to the dry kilns, but it will be operated at a low pressure so that there will be no possibility of cinders being forced out of its stack.

The cinder problem will be eliminated entirely so far as the sawmill is concerned, when the electrification program is completed.

Reports from the Oregon Pulp and Paper company plant indicate that the tests being made with one cinder arrester are still being carried on, and that complete equipment will not be installed until a satisfactory type of arrester is selected.
