

Woodburn Council Gives Permit to Telephone Company

GAS FRANCHISE LAID ON TABLE

County Paving Crew to Repair Work on Streets Of the Town

WOODBURN, Aug. 21.—The city council accepted the petition of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company to place a conduit for cables along the east side of Settlement avenue at its regular meeting in the city hall Tuesday night.

After a lengthy discussion it was decided to accept the application of the company which was submitted some time ago with the provision that the location of man holes would be decided on by the city street committee. This committee will confer with the property owners along the conduit's proposed location and find out from them the most agreeable locations for the holes. The company will begin operations August 26 and the work will be completed by September 15.

E. J. Allen was present at the meeting and asked permission of the city to obtain the lot on which the public market is situated for the purpose of placing a saw dust fuel supply there. Councilman Esby was asked to confer with the residents near there and if it was not objectionable to any of them the permission would be granted to Allen.

Wood bids at \$4.75
Two bids for the city's wood supply for next winter were received by the recorder. One from Miller Bros. giving as their price \$4.75 per cord and another from R. L. Shoop, pricing his wood at \$5.00 per cord for second growth wood and \$5.25 for old wood. The council accepted the first bid upon favorable inspection by the city street committee.

Recorder Beebe received notice of the expiration of fire insurance policy on the city hall and the insurance of the fire department. It was moved to renew both policies, the one for the city hall being \$5,000.

A newly drawn franchise was presented to the council from the Portland Gas and Coke company in reference to its supplying the city with gas. The city recorder, Blaine McCord read the franchise twice and laid it on the table until the next meeting. As the franchise now reads it will comply with the terms of city ordinance applying to the construction of any such appliances by the company as needed and also implies that it within six months from the time the franchise is accepted the grantee does not comply with the agreement the franchise shall be declared void.

The reports of the city treasurer and city recorder were accepted and placed on file. Plans were also made to receive the county paving crew which arrives soon to do some necessary work within the city limits. The council moved that the city drainage ditches be given their annual cleaning as agreed upon by the city when the ditches were dug. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Market Good for New Cars In Rickreall District; Farmers Prosper

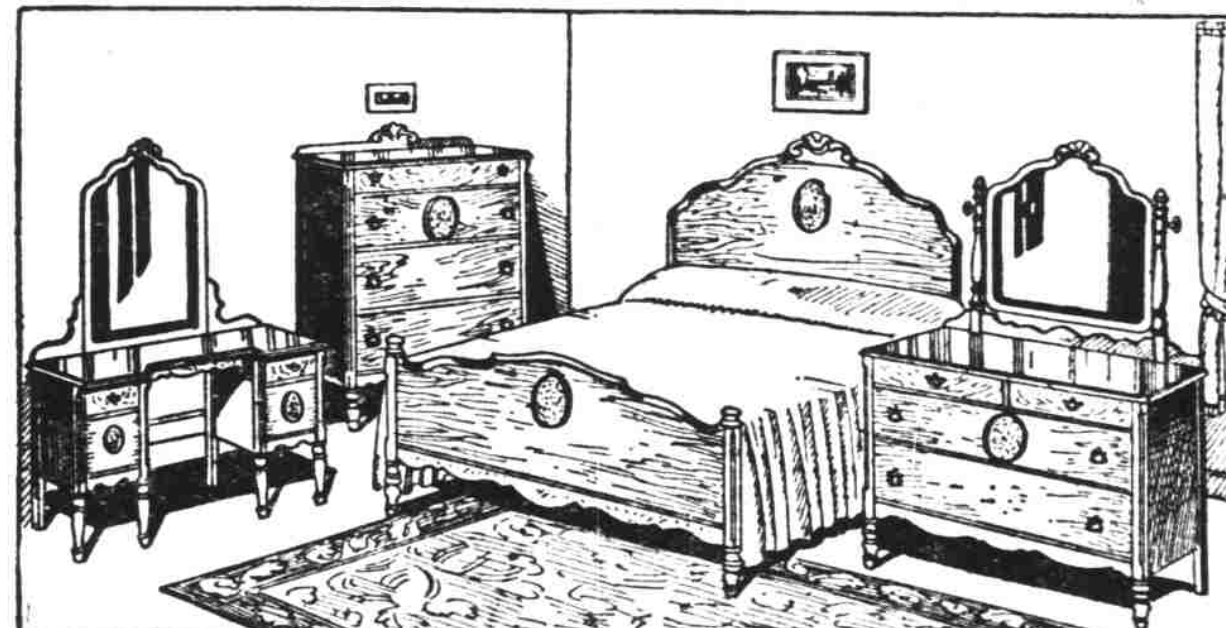
