BLACKBERRY PACK UNUSUALLY LARGE

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at its 12th street plant is having large receipts of beans. Monday's tonnage was one of the largest of the season. They are getting an increasing tonnage of evergreens to can at their 12th street plant, and they commenced on pears yesterday from the Yakima district, and will be in full tilt on Bartlett's by Tuesday.

The Paulus cannery has already contracted for over a million pounds of evergreen blackberries. Still buying them at the regular price, 4 cents. They are putting some of them into cold pack; in both barrels and tins.

They are finishing their run on beans, and will start on carrots after pears, about October 1st.

They expect to begin on pears from Yakima, Tuesday next.

As will be seen in the above, at least three of the Salem canneries are packing evergreen blackberries in the cold pack process this year. Who knows how far this may go in the future, with this great big berry, that up to this year had gone only by the regular canning route?

There were rumors of 10 cents a pound being paid yesterday for 30-35 pears. That is a good price, compared with several years past. But most of the growers have contracted.

PANTAGES ENTERS NOT GUILTY PLEA

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Alexander Pantages, theatre magnate, today pleaded not guilty in superior court to two counts charging statutory offenses against Eunice Pringle, 17 year old dancer. September 23 was set as the date for his trial, which will be before Superior Judge Charles Fricke.

District Attorney Burt Fitts personally arraigned Pantages, who said "not guilty" in an emphatic manner as each count was read.

Pantages was accompanied to court by two attorneys, but none of his family was present. The courtroom was packed.

Fitts advised the court that defense and prosecution attorneys had stipulated, subject to the court's pleasure, that a trial date not before September 17 would be agreeable. He mentioned that the trial of Mrs. Lola Pantages, wife of the defendant, had been set for September 3 and would last about two weeks. The court then set September 23 for the opening of the theatre magnate's trial.

Mrs. Pantages, who is to be tried for second degree murder as the result of the death of Joe Pukumoto in an automobile collision, is represented by Joseph Ford, attorney also for her husband, which necessitated the delayed date of Pantages' trial.

NEUNER NOW BACK FROM WASHINGTON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—George Neuner, United States district attorney for Oregon, returned here today from Washington, D. C., where he was called August 11 by Attorney General Mitchell. Neuner had no direct comment to make upon the speculation that he was called to Washington relative to his appointment as assistant attorney general to succeed Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, resigned.

Neuner said he was one of several attorneys present for a "conference" which considered many phases of the government's legal work and acquainted the attorneys with the new organization of the attorney general's office.

"You can say for me," the district attorney told reporters, "that I have returned from Washington

where I was called by the attorney general, and where it was very, very warm. I expect to get to work at once, preparing for the fall grind in federal court."

Neuner declared he would probably take his vacation next month, however, and will spend the time "drying prunes on my ranch near Riddle."

Creasy to Get Hearing Upon Forgery Charge

Ben Creasy, who had a preliminary hearing before Justice Brazier Small on Thursday, demanded a hearing when charged with forgery of a check. Bail was set at \$2000 and Creasy was committed to the county jail when he proved unable to furnish it. The date for Creasy's hearing has not been set. He was arrested Wednesday when he attempted to buy a suit from a local store, whose owner had been notified that an \$80 check given last Saturday by Creasy was supposed to have been a forgery.

Hit-run Driver is Still at Liberty

Although several suspects were questioned, no definite trace of the hit-and-run driver whose automobile struck and injured Miss Fagland Bartruff late Wednesday night, was found by the police Thursday. It was learned that in addition to painful lacerations, Miss Bartruff suffered a fracture of the ankle.
