

MANY PAIRS OF TWINS SIGN UP

Unique Albany Celebration Promises to Attract Much Interest

ALBANY, Aug. 22.—(Special)—Acceptances have been received by the Twin Round-up program committee from the mayors of a number of Oregon cities to the invitations extended to them to provide the entertainment for the morning of the Round-up day, Monday, September 2, Labor Day.

Eugene, Salem, Corvallis, Lebanon and Brownsville have already formally accepted and will be represented by their mayors and a group of artists. Other acceptances are expected in a short time.

The program committee is leaving the nature of each city's program to the city itself, so that a variety of entertainment will be assured.

The city entertainment feature will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and will continue until noon.

At noon there will be a banquet in honor of all the mayors and their parties.

In the afternoon the twins will hold the center of the stage for several hours. There will be a parade of the twins, the judging and the twin competitions in various contests.

Late in the afternoon there will be the program of water sports, the bathing beauty contest and various other competitions.

Registration of twins are coming in rapidly and present indications are that the entry list will be much larger than last year when 160 pairs came to Albany.

Twins born in Marion county before Oregon was admitted into the Union are planning to attend Albany's Twin Round-up, September 2.

A letter from Robert L. Withrow, managing editor of the Curry County Reporter, to Ted Musgrave, chairman of registration, describes these twins, W. W. and W. R. Miller, as being hale and hearty and alike as two peas.

Mr. Withrow, who has known the men for two years, is obliged to examine their faces carefully to find on the cheek of one a tiny mole, a symbol of identification dear to the heart of novelists. One of the twins is expected home shortly from a prospecting trip, when he will have his hair and mustache trimmed to look exactly like that of his brother.

SLAYER OF NURSE HELD FOR MURDER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—National leaders of the American Red Cross today paid tribute to Edie May Ashmun, executive secretary of the San Francisco chapter, while the irresponsible war veteran she had befriended was arraigned in police court for her murder.

The police services for Miss Ashmun, who was stabbed to death by David W. Lizarraaga, formerly of Texas, when she failed to comply with his demand for money, will be held tomorrow afternoon.

Miss Ashmun had been in Red Cross work ever since the World war and was known throughout the country. She had been assigned to the local chapter the past three years. She was a native of Fresno, Cal.

GARIBALDI'S HYMN MAY REGAIN FAVOR

ROME—(AP)—The "Garibaldi Hymn," adjudged the most stirring of Italian martial songs, and the nearest in zest and "go" to the immortal "Marsellaise," of France, promises to come back into official favor, now that the 60-year-old differences between church and state have been settled.

It enjoyed a certain vogue before the advent of Fascism, and was played at many public functions immediately after the Royal March—notably in France after the Armistice, in view of the valorous deeds of the "Garibaldi Legion" in the Argonne.

Then came Fascism and the introduction of "civismoza," that lifting hymn of youth which is considered a second national anthem. There was a movement to bring the Garibaldi ditty up beside it; but Garibaldi was a Mason and had republican leanings, so official Fascism feared for its inclusion lest its rendition give rise to opposition demonstrations.

The opposition once thoroughly quashed, there was again question of reviving it; but at that very moment delicate negotiations were begun with the Holy See, and it would hardly have done to give honor to the anthem of a rugged old fighter who had named a pet donkey after Pope Pius IX.

Now that church and state are outwardly at least, destined "in unity to dwell," the ban has been lifted, and public ceremonies may again be enlivened by the stirring "call to arms" that prefaces the Garibaldian song, followed by the lines:

"The tombs open! The dead arise! Our martyrs have all come back! With the sword in the fist, the laurels on their brows, the flame and the love of Italy in their hearts!"

PARIS—(AP)—Catering to the taste of Americans in Paris has been perfected to a point that permits a middle-western man to live here exactly as he does back home, with only two differences, the scenery and the quality of the drinks.

If he doesn't drink, there is only one difference, and the French are modifying that just as fast as they can put up electric signs, step-back buildings and install filling stations.

Those tourists who want to enjoy continental customs can do so, but they are no longer obliged to. For example, Paris hotels have more rooms with private bath than any city east of New York. One can talk English all day long without a struggle. In some

3 MINERS KILLED BY FOREST FIRES

WALLACE, Ida., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Three miners lost their lives and another was overcome by timber gas, caused by smoke from nearby forest fires, in the Cedar Creek Mining and Development company southeast of Murray today.

The dead are Russell Lee, 32, mine foreman; W. N. Welch, 28, a laborer; and Harold Matthews, 28, a laborer. George Reese, who made his way to the surface before he collapsed, was in a hospital tonight, but was expected to recover. Two other miners who assisted in rescue work were slightly affected.

Lee, Welch and Matthews were sent into the mine to inspect it for the gas and had reached a stop below the 2500 foot level before they ran into it, rescuers said. While they entered the mine at 10 o'clock this morning they were not missed until after 1 o'clock, when they failed to report for lunch. Reese, Elmer Hall and William Heake went into the workings to search for them, but were forced to return.

A rescue crew from the Helca mine at Wallace found the bodies tonight, but are unable to bring them to the surface, it was said, until the gas could be blown from the mine.

WOMEN'S AIR RACE NOT TO BE STOPPED

CLEVELAND, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Floyd J. Logan, chairman of the national air races and exposition here, said today the women's air derby from Santa Monica, Cal., to Cleveland, will not be stopped.

"If any of the planes are not in good condition there is ample time to inspect them at Douglas, Arizona, before they take off tomorrow morning," Logan said.

The race chairman said he had a telegram from Joe Archer, representing the exchange club of Phoenix, Ariz., saying reports of tampering with the race airplanes were not substantiated. The exchange clubs of the United States, which sponsored the derby, were representing the air race officials in the various stopping points of the race.

Logan said if any reports of sabotage could be substantiated "of course I will investigate them."
