POULTRYMEN ARGUE TARIFF

Hearing Held Before Senator McNary and Congressman Hawley

A committee of prominent poultrymen of the state, the members of which were J. L. Russell and Merle Moore of Corvallis, Ambrose Brownell, Milwaukie, and Lloyd A. Lee of Salem, were granted a hearing by Senator McNary and Representative Hawley, in Salem this week. Messrs. Brownell and Lee comprised the poultrymen's committee on the egg tariff and Messrs. Russell and Moore, the Walsh senate joint resolution No. 9, providing for state quarantine, which measure is vigorously opposed by all national poultry associations as well as most state organizations. It is the wish of the Oregon poultry committee on the egg tariff that the rate on dried eggs in particular, be raised above the rate named in the new tariff bill. This committee stated that it is well pleased with the cordial reception and courteous hearing given them at this conference with Senator McNary and Mr. Hawley.

The other committee which discussed the Walsh senate joint resolution with Senator McNary and Mr. Hawley were equally well pleased with the views on the subject as expressed by these two Oregon representatives in congress and are more than ever convinced that the poultry industry of not only Oregon, but the whole United States will be safeguarded by these two Oregon representatives who very fortunately occupy committee positions which enable them to be of the greatest service to the poultrymen.

HEARING SCHEDULED ON POWER PROJECT

A hearing will be held in the state engineer's office here September 24, in connection with the application of O'Neill Brothers and Callahan, San Francisco, paper manufacturers, who are seeking to develop a power project on the North Santiam river.

This was decided at a preliminary meeting of the several persons and state departments interested in the proposed project here Thursday. The proposed development, as outlined by L. M. Curly, Portland attorney, contemplates the construction of a dam 21 feet high, 470 feet in length, and appropriation of 650 second feet of water from the Santiam river. The project would develop 7755 horsepower and cost approximately \$800,000.

W. O. Hadley, superintendent of fisheries for the state game commission, made it plain Thursday that his department was not opposed to any legitimate power development, but would insist upon the construction of an adequate fishway. A similar view was expressed by representatives of the state fish commission.

Engineers for O'Neill Brothers and Callahan will arrive in Salem within the next two weeks, when further investigation of the

Mr. Curly said his employees desired to play fair with all state departments, and that every effort would be made to reach some satisfactory agreement to the fishway construction prior to the hearing.
