Silverton Jersey Breeders Discuss Standards For Registration

SILVERTON, August 27 .- Silverton Jersey breeders who attended the annual Jersey Cattle elub picnic at Woodburn Sunday report that they are very interested in the question discussed

One of the speakers expressed the desire that grade Jerseys who had pure breeding back of them for two generations be given certificates of registration. A vote on this showed that the large majority were opposed to the sugges-

The suggestion that the registered Jersey standard be raised met with greatest approval, Methods of obtaining this end were discussed and the suggestion that all Jerseys from registered stock be made to meet a type and production test before they be given certificates of registration met with much approval from the 100 interested Jersey people who attended the meeting.

Silverton Jersey men expressed themselves in favor of such a ruling as it would greatly tend to raise the standard of registered stock. Breeders with registered cattle would not then be tempted to retain every animal which was subject to registration regardless of its value as a producer. Members of the Jersey club are urging all of the club members to keep a record of their production and to retain only such cattle as are good producers.


