

BULL MARKET RESUMES AGAIN

Industries Show Extraordinary Vitality as Rallies Staged

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Renewed evidence of the extraordinary vitality of industry prompted a resumption of bullish activity in today's stock market, and an impressive group of rallies and specialties were bid up rapidly, until the last hour of trading, when a wave of profit taking swept through the market, and much of the day's advance was lost.

Such leading carrier stocks as Pennsylvania, New York Central, Norfolk & Western and Union Pacific mounted around 5 points each to record levels, and Atchafalaya moved up more than 8 points to a record price above 292, but closed at 289. Lackawanna moved up about 5 points to a new peak on rumors that important banking interests may seek to acquire control in the open market. It later lost most of its gain in realizing, Erie, St. Paul, Baltimore & Ohio, Nickel Plate and Chicago and Northwestern were among others reaching new peaks. Pere Marquette was a higher flier, soaring 17 1/2 points to a new top at 230. Continental Insurance, said to be a large holder of rail stocks, was also carried to new high ground.

U. S. freight, U. S. Industrial alcohol, Air Reduction, American tobacco, American water works, Eatman Kodak, Coca Cola, General American Tank car, R. H. Macy, Ingersoll Rand and Otis steel were among other issues reaching unprecedented levels with substantial gains. Goodyear was bid up 6 points on the strength of the zeppelin flight. U. S. steel sold up a few points, then reacted and closed steady. Some profit taking appeared in the oils but Pan America reached still a higher peak, and Transcontinental was sent to a new high at 15 1/4 in a huge turnover. Motors were fairly firm, but the coppers were inclined to sag. Stocks swept down for net losses of about 2 to 5 points in the late selling included such prominent issues as American Telephone, Allis Chalmers, Allied Chemical, Consolidated Gas, General Electric, General Railway Signal, Gillette, International Telephone, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Radio, F. G. Shattuck, and United Aircraft.
