To Teach Science in Grades—An experiment which embodies one of the educational advances which is gaining considerable ground will be carried out in the Salem grade schools this year when elementary science will be taught one or two periods daily, Superintendent George W. Hug has said. Miss Merle McKelvey, who studied this movement while attending summer school in California, will be placed in charge of the classes. Miss McKelvey is a member of the high school science faculty.

New Plan Milk Inspection—A new plan of milk inspection which is believed will be more satisfactory to Marion county will be started here within a short period. J. B. CITY MAN REVIVES WORTHLESS FARM

WAUPACA, Wis. — (AP) — What a few years ago was a hopeless piece of "blow land" has been rejuvenated into one of the richest farms in Waupaca county—and by a city man, an agricultural novice.

The first thing C. J. Shrock did was to tap reliable sources of advice for information, using the most promising suggestions for building up the soil.

In a few years he had the loose sand permanently anchored with humus alfalfa and clover roots. The soil has changed during his treatment from a white color to a rich sandy loam.

Today he is raising fine crops of alfalfa, corn and potatoes. So great is his success that farmers and agricultural experts come from distant points to study his methods. Neighboring farmers are following his pattern.

His prospects this year are 300 bushels of potatoes to an acre in a 30-acre tract and an alfalfa yield of three tons to the acre on a 30-acre field.

Construction of 8 Miles Of Coast Highway Awaits Action by Douglas County

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29 — (AP) — If Douglas county is disposed to participate in the cost of construction of the eight miles of the Oregon coast highway in that county the highway commission will prepare to proceed with the project.

Douglas county, it was said at the meeting of the state highway commission here today, has shown disposition to cooperate in the construction of the highway while Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Coos, Curry and Lane have all contributed.

The unfinished gap in the highway lies in Douglas and Lane counties, with about three miles in Lincoln. It was said that the road had progressed to a point where most of the grading will cost about \$100,000 per mile.

The commission announced that it will receive bids at its September meeting for one and one-half miles of work south of Giesland on the coast road. Clatsop county announced that it is willing to acquire a right-of-way for a new highway between Oregon City and the Multnomah county line, which means virtually to the city limits of Portland and the commission, in turn, declared it has secured federal aid, representing \$1 per foot of the cost, to be completed in 60 days, it was said.

Columbia county made application for a market road from Rainier to Aplary, which was allowed by the commission. The commission was informed that the county made the request at the

insistence of Longview bridge people and that the county was promised outside funds for the building of such a road.

The road will cost about \$200,000.

Another big project and one that has been hanging fire before the commission for several years is the Siuslaw road.

Government money is ready in this project and the county has acquired the right-of-way, but the Southern Pacific legal department wants the highway commission to provide a bond since the railroad must move its tracks.

As the work will be in charge of the government and not the state the commission's legal department has been studying the question for some time.

It announced today that it was "ready to shoot."

Included in new projects advertised for September were widening and resurfacing of the Pacific highway from 15 to 29 feet from Medford to Phoenix and grading of the Herra Ridge section of the central Oregon highway east of Bend.

Resolutions were received from McMinnville and Astoria asking the commission to issue \$1,000,000 of road bonds a year for three years for use on the Oregon Coast highway. The resolution was placed on file without comment.

Road work aggregating \$632,330 was awarded while contracts totaling \$59,583 were temporarily held up pending approval of federal investigation as to material to be used.

ESPEE PUTS ON 9 SWITCHING CREWS

The Southern Pacific is now maintaining in Salem nine switching crews of five men each. This is the highest number ever in the service. At the peak of the season last year, there were eight. It is possible that an additional crew will be needed before the pear canning and hop picking seasons are over, and if so another one will be put on.

It is not long ago that one switching crew could do all the work here. And not so very long ago when no switching crew at all was maintained in Salem; when the local freight train engines did all the work.

This is regarded as a fair indication of the increasing business of Salem. Day and night empty cars have to be "spotted" where they can be loaded with freight going out of Salem. And day and night cars loaded with freight in Salem, from the canneries, packing houses, paper mills, converting plant, lime mills and other establishments have to be taken out by the switching crews and meshed up with the freight trains that are passing. The Oregon Electric maintains one switching crew and engine.

BRITISH SAY JEWS WELL PROTECTED

JERUSALEM, Aug. 28.—(AP)—There are enough British troops in Palestine to protect all Jewish colonies said General Boddie to a deputation of Jews who visited him late today. The general who is commander of British troops in the country, assured his visitors it would not longer be necessary for Jews to evacuate their homes.

Reports continued filter in of scattered disorders, but most of them related to incidents that occurred several days ago. One of these reports said the famous orange plantation named "Gang-hayim," or "Garden of Chayim," in honor of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist organization, had been destroyed. There was a big demonstration of joy at Tel Aviv today when the first donations were received from America for the relief fund. They were of \$25,000 each and came from Julius Rosenwald of Chicago and Nathan Straus of New York.

Jerusalem was peaceful throughout the day and similar conditions prevailed in the other cities of the country. As troops and marines of the British forces extended their areas of control, a greater feeling of security spread rapidly although rumors of what was happening on the trans-Jordanian border persisted.

One report, which was not confirmed, said Arabs in Nablus, a city in Central Palestine, had raised the Turkish flag and declared themselves independent of British control. Another report was that Arabs at Tiberias, on the Sea of Galilee, were organizing for an armed outbreak and that they expected help from Trans-Jordan.

HOMES TO RENT ARE SCARCE IN THIS CITY

Furnished houses to let are almost as hard to find in Salem now as the proverbial needle in a haystack, almost every realtor reports. There is a brisk demand for furnished houses and a heavy one for unfurnished homes, with practically every desirable home being taken up rapidly. A survey of the realty firms show.

One real estate firm says it keeps the sales force hustling to find desirable homes; another reports about the only livable homes not being taken are the extra large ones; another is wondering where to find homes for four families who have sent word that they are leaving Texas for Salem.

Approach of school is given by some dealers for the new activity in house-renting; others find many of the customers are to be permanent settlers.

While a casual look over the city may reveal a number of vacant houses, closer examination will show that most of these are run down or show some other serious defect objectionable to the average home-hunter.

EAKER WILL START NEW FLIGHT SOON

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The United States Aircraft and Transport corporation announced today that Captain Ira Eaker and Lieut. Bernard S. Thompson would start another transcontinental endurance flight tomorrow.

Captain Eaker has advised the office here that damages to the Shuttle plane which forced it down in Cleveland would be repaired today and the flyers would be over New York at 5 a. m., tomorrow to start out for Oregon, Calif., on a nonstop trip. They intended to carry out their original plans of making five "Shuttles" across the country.

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
