Preservation of World Harmony is Goal

Out of these conversations the heads of the two governments hope to insure the preservation of world peace and the development of cordial relations and good will among nations.

Never before in the history of the United States has there been so unique an occasion as the event as that which began with the departure for the Virginia mountains.

The initiation of talks between the presidents of the United States and the heads of foreign governments in other ways has been a ceremony called for by the formality of international intercourse. The instant the two statesmen departed for the presidential retreat, however, there was begun a peace mission of cordiality but with the most intimate cordiality.

Unattended by any large group of officials or diplomats, the Hoover party departed from Washington much as many another family leaving for a quiet weekend. It included Sir Robert Vane Sittart, British undersecretary of state for foreign affairs and private secretary to Mr. MacDonald; Dr. Joel T. Boone, the president's personal physician, and Miss Anne Shankey, a White House stenographer.

Secretary Stimson and Mrs. Stimson left for Rapidan from their home, to join the presidential party at the camp.

By the time they arrived Mrs. Gann had returned from the market, smoothed her hair, and donned her crystal necklace and pearl earrings. She was wearing a black satin gown, with a "V" neck and pleated skirt, when her butler admitted the official callers.

About 10 minutes later Miss MacDonald and Lady Isabella left to complete their calls by visiting Mrs. Vincent Massey at the Canadian legation and Mrs. Michael McWhite, wife of the Irish Free state's envoy in Washington.

Mrs. Gann said after the call that she was pleased, "as anyone would be." She was struck by the natural charm and the simple grace of the prime minister's daughter, she added, and found the morning pleasant. Mrs. Gann had not yet decided what she would wear to the reception at the embassy on Tuesday. She said she had not yet unpacked the things she brought from Kansas in a trunk.

(Continued from Page 1.) In her amazing confession, she told of the body having been embalmed in spices and lowered into the grave in company with a second casket containing the bodies of seven dogs.

Child Is Reared in Atmosphere of Cults

She said she adopted Willa in Portland, Ore., when the girl was two years of age, and that the child had been reared in the atmosphere of this and other cults, until, when she was 16 years old she became ill and died while acting as cult priestess, representing "the tree of life."

None but members of the cult knew of the girl's death, Mrs. Rhoades said, and she herself, acting in the cult role of "the road to the kingdom," ordered her adopted daughter's body placed on ice until the burial was arranged. The frozen remains were moved several times from house to house, before actual interment took place, she said.

"But you shall not take my daughter," Mrs. Rhoades screamed at the officers, when she learned that plans were being made to excavate beneath the house, she became hysterical. The efforts of several patrolmen were required to quiet her.

Guards Suspected of Smuggling Weapons for Use Of Prisoners

(Continued from Page 1.) fire against certain guards. They picked out men they hated, and marked them for death. And this, in turn, brought about another startling theory—that some of the guards themselves may have had a part in the affray.

Direct charges were brought to the attention of the investigators that James Purdue and Danny Daniels were members of a secret organization to which several of the guards were known to have belonged.

"It is even possible," said an official, "that some of the guns may have been smuggled in by friendly guards. Such a situation is amazing to contemplate and difficult to believe but there are all sorts of whispers that must be run down. It is difficult to get the truth from convicts."

The conspiracy, therefore, embraced a far wider field than was at first supposed. It dates back to the time, several months ago, when the entire penitentiary was nervous over reports that Danny Daniels, James Purdue and other desperate men had received "cannons" which they had hidden under the concrete near the bakery shop. At that time Warden Crawford had the entire penitentiary searched and put a force of men at work digging up the concrete

McBride is Incensed at Rum Charge

Justice Thomas A. McBride of the Oregon state supreme court, Saturday branded as false and ridiculous charges made by E. C. Condit of Portland, in a suit filed against A. Neppach and Thomas Mannix, that Justice McBride received quantities of liquor while cases in which Condit was interested were pending in the supreme court.

Justice McBride said that with the exception of riding with Condit from Portland to Salem one time, he had no contact with Condit. "We were introduced in Portland by a man whose name I do not remember," said Justice McBride, "and I later accepted an invitation to ride to Salem in his automobile. We did not discuss any case at that time. I do not remember anything about his case in the supreme court, and I am sure that I did not write the opinion."

"As for the charge that I received liquor from Condit it is absurd and apparently was manufactured out of whole cloth."
