Mr. and Mrs. Derby of Garibaldi were visiting their daughters, Mrs. P. A. Bernard and Mrs. W. M. Bernard.

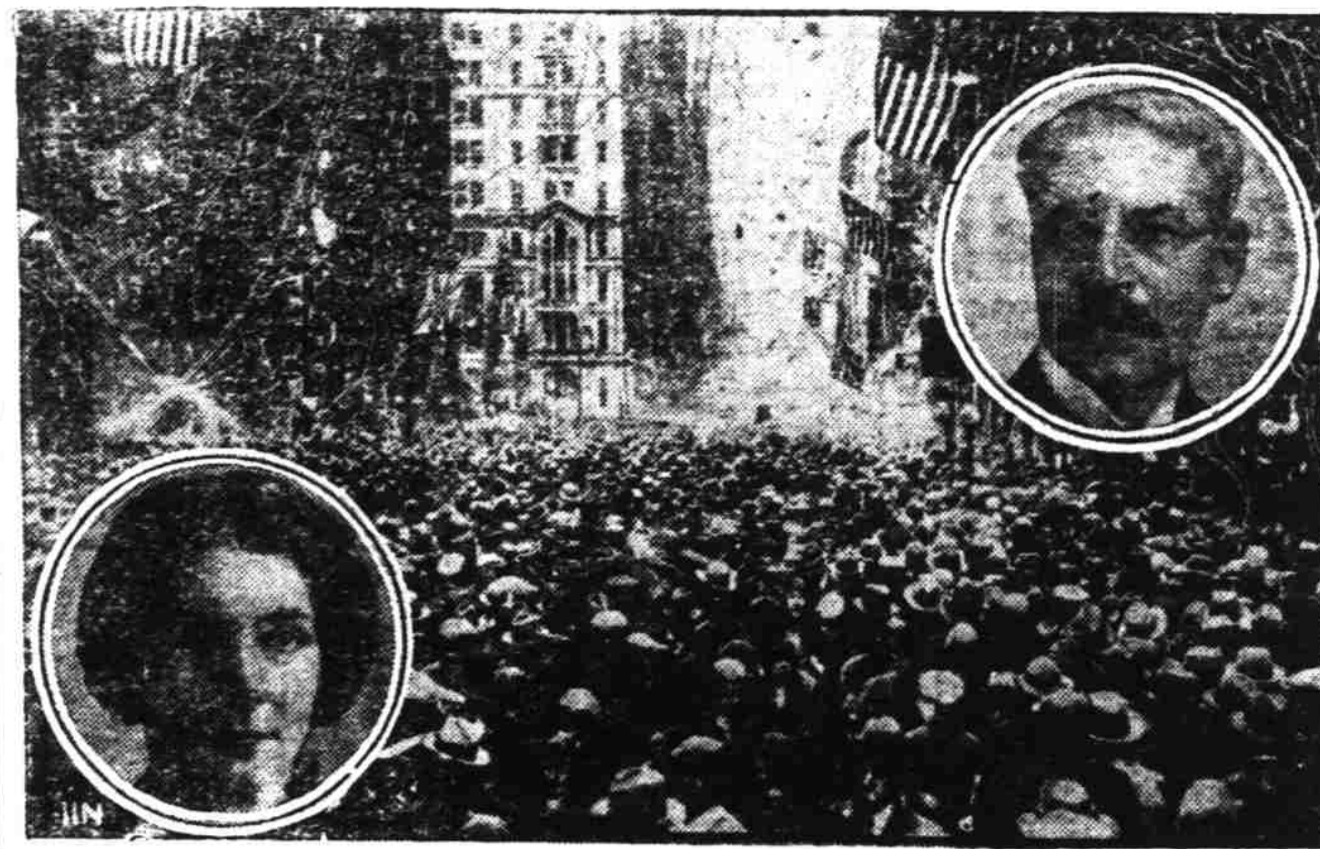
Mr. Steve Merten and son, Steve, of St. Paul and Mr. Gauschnider of Portland left on a feast hunting trip to Pendleton.

Labish Land is Being Re-Tiled

LABISH, Oct. 9.—Every fall immediately after the onions are harvested, the owners of the Beaver dam ground commence the re-tiling of the worn-out tiling. Often whole fields are completely re-tiled. The Hayes company has a large crew at work digging ditches and hauling the new tiles to the scene of operations where they are installed by workmen, long experienced in the art. The Hayes concern expects to lay approximately three miles of new tile the coming fall, most of it to be laid in the onion ground.

The tiles are placed in a continuous row and covered with beaver-dam. The depth at which they are placed varies from three to seven feet, depending upon the natural slope of the land in relation to the waste ditch and its elevation. The proper placing of the tiles is a matter of highest importance inasmuch as the volume

He plans to spend several weeks here, writing several articles on his trip and arranging several reels of motion pictures as well as some 1000 still pictures taken on the long journey.

Burg was accompanied on part of the trip by Dr. George Rebec, dean of the graduate school of the University of Oregon.

Dallas Loses Water Works Suit

DALLAS, Oct. 9.—H. V. Gates, lessee of the city water works has secured a judgment against the city for costs in the suit brought against him by the city council. This suit was brought to have Gates appoint an appraiser to meet with one selected by the city, they to select the third party to determine the value of the water system, preparatory to the purchase of Gates interest by the city.

Judgment secured by Gates amounts to \$15.50. It is reported that the city will carry the matter to the supreme court.

DOUKHOBOR COLONY GROWING RAPIDLY

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 9.—(AP)—Radical Doukhobors from British Columbia, Saskatchewan and the United States have swelled the Sons of Freedom colony at Porto Rico, near Nelson, B. C., from 150 to 400 persons, it was reported today.

Some 150 members of the Sons of Freedom sect were taken to Porto Rico recently after they had been arrested for refusing to give up their encampment on the outskirts of Nelson, where they had gathered in protest to the arrest and imprisonment of more than 100 of their number, who had staged a nude parade at South Slooan. The Nelson encampment was condemned as unsanitary.

The Porto Rico settlement was offered to the fanatical group by law-abiding Doukhobors. S. F. Tolmie, premier of British Columbia, said he was seeking co-operation of the federal government to restrain the movement towards the colony.

The main feature of the evening will be the re-organization and appointment of committee. A short program will follow.

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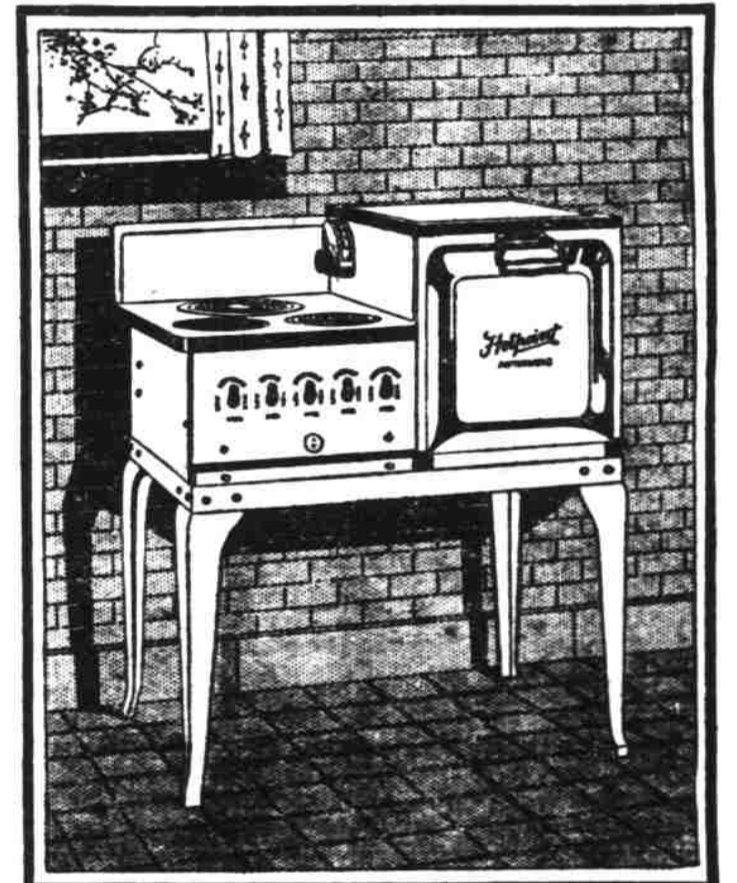
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
