**FIVE KILLED WHEN
2 TRAINS COLLIDE**

**Undetermined Number Hurt
When Crash Occurs in
Pennsylvania**

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 10. (AP)—Five persons were killed and an undetermined number injured tonight, according to a report from Dr. J. S. Buzzard, when the Pittsburgh-Washington express of the Pennsylvania railroad ran head on into an extra freight train at Portage, near Johnstown. Dr. Buzzard said some of the injured were being treated at his office.

Relief trains with nurses and doctors were sent from Johnstown and Pittsburgh, the Pennsylvania railroad offices here announced. Traffic on all the main lines of the railroad was blocked, it was said.

Dr. Buzzard, who was reached at his office in Portage, said one of the dead men had been identified as William McClain, fireman of the passenger train. The railroad officers here said Engineer W. T. Johnson of the passenger train and Engineer W. C. Reed of the freight, also were dead.

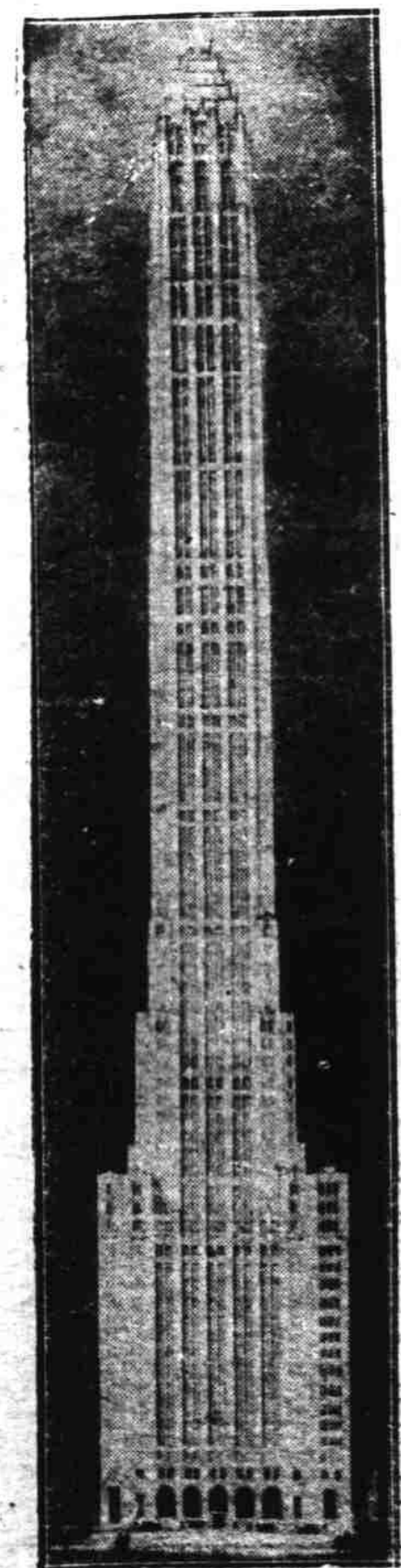
The railroad's statement said the Pittsburgh-Washington express was made up of two express cars, attached to the train behind the locomotive, three coaches and four sleepers, the sleepers being added that only the express cars were derailed. The sleepers were carried to Wilkesbarre, Harrisburg, and Washington.

**FRANCE TO IMPORT
FEWER U. S. PRUNES**

The French importers of American prunes are looking for a decrease in imports from the United States this year since California prices are high and the French crop is larger than last year, according to the current news bulletin of the federal department of agriculture.

It is expected that the domestic consumption of prunes in France will be somewhat reduced during the 1929-30 season because of the large fresh fruit crops this year, especially of apples which can be carried over.

Tallest



Plans have been filed for the erection of a new 71 story office building which will rise 925 feet above the ground, on the block bounded by Exchange Place, Beaver, Williams and Hanover streets in the financial district of New York. As far as official records show this will be the tallest building in the world, but its glory will be short lived when plans are filed for a new structure on the site of the old Waldorf-Astoria Hotel on 34th street, which will tower 1,000 feet above the city's streets.

The Hamburg business in old and new crop California, Oregon and Washington prunes was very quiet during September but prices are firm, according to Consul Kobi at that post. Second hand business has also been small with prices below first hand quotations.
