

# Local News Briefs

**Looks Wrong Way**—In reporting a collision between his automobile and one driven by C. M. Eppley, Friday night at Center and Commercial streets, Jack R. Harding, 330 North High, stated that he was looking the wrong way and that Eppley had the right of way. Other collisions reported included one between cars driven by L. W. Patton, Salem route 5, and O. B. Gingrich, on State street Friday night; another involving Henry B. Unruh, 1022 Oak, and Alberta St. Clair, at Marion and Commercial Friday noon; another between cars operated by A. J. Vick, 1499 North Liberty, and H. J. Damus of McMinnville, at State and Cottage—or Church, as they disagreed on this detail. Damus claimed that Vick did not signal for a turn.

Barrett of Portland; one sister, Mrs. Leighton Templeton of Portland; and by her stepmother, Mrs. Phoebe Cording of Brownsville, Mrs. Iwan had lived in Portland the past three years.
