

COURT TO HEAR JOSEPH'S CASE

Mannix Charges Referred by Multnomah County Bar Association

Accusations in the disbarment proceedings filed by George W. Joseph, Portland attorney, against Thomas B. Mannix, Monday were referred to the state supreme court by the grievance committee of the Multnomah county bar association. In a letter accompanying the accusations, it was pointed out that Mannix had questioned the authority of the bar association to subpoena witnesses to hear the proceeding.

Joseph alleged in his complaint that Mannix, while acting as an attorney, conspired with other persons to profit from the administration of the Wempe estate.

In case the supreme court assumes jurisdiction of the proceeding, an order will follow citing Mannix to appear and show cause why he should not be disbarred.

Subsequent to the filing of this proceeding, Mannix last week filed papers in the supreme court asking for the disbarment of Joseph. The court issued an order citing Joseph to appear November 4. Mannix charged that Joseph and Henry Hansen, Portland newspaperman, conspired with other persons unknown to the complainant, to plant liquor at the home of John L. Rand, an associate justice of the supreme court.

The purpose of the "plant," Mannix alleged, was to discredit members of the supreme court, and make it appear that Mannix was the carrier of the liquor.

It was indicated here Monday that both disbarment proceedings would be referred to a circuit judge or referee, with authority to subpoena witnesses, and hear the testimony.

INTERESTING PERSONS

The Richters, Artists

WE are all explorers—through exploration and its twin activity, experimentation, the race of mankind goes on and up—if you are an optimist—down if you are a pessimist.

Most of us confine our explorations to the insignificant or at least the unspectacular. They are a sideline in our existence, the reason being a lack of opportunity, inspiration, necessity or courage, to attempt a spectacular or outstanding exploration.

But there are the few who stand by themselves apart—who through the accident of position or the trend of disposition, wend their way into uncharted courses—in science, art, literature, world geography, or what-not, the results are the same—the explorer becomes a matter of interest to the rest of his fellow men.

Real Explorer Not Adversely Affected

As a rule the real explorer is not the one who wears his identity on the label of his coat, nor can you tell him by his appearance. This accounts for the reason no doubt why I passed by two real explorers on the streets of Salem only to recognize them after being told about them and then being introduced to them.

By name they are Madeleine Richter, portrait artist and her writer-artist husband, Anthony K. Richter, who came to Salem by chance three weeks ago, and, liking it, decided to stay. Either of them may be found almost any hour of the day at Gilbert's studio, where tucked back in one corner among the prints and engravings and old tapestries, facing a window, Mrs. Richter bends over a sheet of paper, pencil busy, head moving quickly as she observes a subject posed before her. "What is she doing?" Making a profile portrait which when finished will be a study of the subject in black and white. Artist Himself Presents Interesting Study

Mrs. Richter is herself a study. A shock of short, black, curly hair that stands out in a dusky frame about her face, olive skin, rather large, soft dark eyes, all bespeaking the French blood which she claims.

Born in South Dakota, married in 1922 to Anthony K. Richter, explorer, author and art photographer, she too became an explorer. Following their honeymoon she left with Mr. Richter for the South Seas where she and he spent three years, painting, writing and exploring. She spent three months with Mr. Richter on the Pearl Islands, making a record for herself as the only woman artist who had ever lived on these islands perched only 12 feet above the level of the sea.

Prize Won in Tahiti With Oil Painting

In Tahiti Mrs. Richter was awarded first prize by the French government for the best representative study in oil painting of a native type. This picture, "The Study of a Tahitian," was purchased by the French government. Another one of her paintings hangs in the museum of Papeete, the capital city of the South Seas islands.

Still another of Mrs. Richter's pictures now hanging in Papeete, called "The Madonna of the South Seas," is a life study of one of the native girls which Eugene O'Brien made a character in one of his books.

For the past two years the Richters have been in California. "But," said Mr. Richter, "we are going back to Tahiti. It is the loveliest place in the world that I have found so far. The climate is perfect, and the people—they are natural, good, honest and the best friends for which one could ask. They are in their primitiveness, most interesting studies." Love of South Seas Felt by Author

It was easy to see that the heart of the artist and dreamy author was speaking when Tahiti was under discussion. Other artists and authors, too, have answered their lure. Eugene O'Brien has made himself famous with his study of the romantic South Seas, and many others have done likewise. Gauguin, the late French artist, had his beginning there. Mr. Richter told the story of Gauguin's life in Tahiti as told him by a trader named Palmer, who supplied Gauguin with the necessities of life while the artist was

"An explorer? Did he not express the real heart of an explorer? They do not really 'belong' to any country. They are of the world, and it is their playground.
