gasoline tanks of the ship could be emptied in two minutes and then closed airtight. Diteman, at the time he purchased the plane, asked particularly about this feature.

Officers of the airplane company said the ship carried sufficient gasoline tanks, if made airtight, to keep it afloat indefinitely.

Engineers also recalled that after Diteman had flown the ship to Montana he had reported the gasoline consumption as being only 4 1/2 gallons an hour. A cruise of 400 miles at this rate would require an hour or less to obtain at this rate of consumption, the pilot said.

Added Receipts
May Retard Plane
At this rate Diteman could reach the coast in more than 36 hours. Additional gasoline tanks, believed added to the airplane after it left the plant here, might retard the ship's progress considerably.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—(AP)—F. Diteman, Sr., father of the cattleman-aviator, who has been unreported since taking off from Harbor Grace, New Foundland, ostensibly for London, left here tonight to join his son's wife at Billings, Mont. Warren A. Erwin, the flier's brother-in-law, with whom the older Ditemans have been living, said Diteman, Sr., talked with long distance telephone with the missing aviator's wife this afternoon.

The flier's mother remained here.
Parents Still Think Flyer Will Get There
Erwin said the parents continued optimistic despite the lack of news. He declared they placed no great faith in reports which indicated that Diteman might have started to land at Jullitshab, Greenland, where gasoline was said to have been ordered two months ago for a "Mr. Diteman."

"Diteman took off on a non-stop flight to London," Erwin said. "Of that we are certain, and although he had not arrived at his destination we are confident he is safe."

The flier's mother declared she would instinctively know if any accident had befallen her son. "I do not feel that way," she said, "because I am anxious."

Golden Hind Different Plane, Says Father
Reasons said to have been advanced by Major Gilbert H. Eckerson of Springfield as to why the aviator was "committing suicide" by hopping off for London were declared erroneous in every detail by Diteman, Sr., before his departure.

Major Eckerson, according to reports from Eugene, had said Diteman Jr.'s plane had been ordered kept on the ground as unseaworthy by the department of commerce.

"That was a different plane entirely," Diteman, Sr., said. "Urban did fly that plane from Cody, Wyo., to Billings, but it was not his plane and he was flying for someone else. The Golden Hind is the plane he took off in yesterday, is new and is not even of the same make as the other."

G. O. P. PATRONAGE IN SOUTH PROBED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Acting quickly today after it had examined a confidential report of the department of justice, the senate patronage committee called Attorney General Mitchell's attention to a dozen charges that a federal district of South Carolina was unfit to hold office.

The letter was written on a motion by Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, a member of the committee, which was adopted unanimously.

The report, which Chairman Brookhart said had been "pig-snooled" by the department, was prepared by J. Edgar Hoover, chief of its bureau of investigation, on the basis of evidence gathered by a special investigation.

Among the charges the document cited was one that J. D. E. Meyer, the district attorney, had associated with three other attorneys in the private practice of law and had extended "favoritism" to their clients.

The three lawyers were named as Mayor Thomas P. Stoney of Charleston, A. R. McGowan and James Allen, all of whom had offices adjoining Meyer's. The quartet was described as "the four horsemen" of Charleston.

WATER BOY LOSES HIS JOB AS KING

KABUL, Afghanistan, Oct. 23.—(AP)—After holding out for nearly a week in the fortress Djebul-Serad, Bacha Sikan, erstwhile king of Afghanistan and former "water boy of the north," surrendered today with 1,000 loyal adherents to Nadir Khan, Afghanistan's new king, on condition that their lives be spared.

Thus the tumultuous reign of the former water carrier who tasted the sweets of kingship for ten months, after driving Amanullah from the throne, came to a dramatic close.

All the officials of the late court and cabinet, including Bacha's brother and Sold Hussein, governor of Mazar, were granted amnesty immediately by Nadir Khan. The fate of Bacha himself remains in doubt. He and his captured followers have been taken to Kabul.

Nadir Khan has reestablished all the former government officers, re-organizing officials employed by Amanullah. In reply to the congratulations of Amanullah, who is living in exile in Rome, Nadir Khan, who was elected king only last week, telegraphed:

"The era of your government will be engraved in golden letters in the history of Afghanistan. We will follow loyally the path traced by you."

Nadir Khan was formerly a loyal adherent of Amanullah.

PUBLIC INVITED TO VIEW INCINERATOR

"Open house" will be held at the city incinerator today, and the incinerator committee of the city council is anxious that as many local residents as possible may visit the garbage disposal plant, not primarily to see how successfully it is operating, but rather that they may appreciate the part they should play in making it successful.

Alderman L. J. Simeral, chairman of the recently appointed incinerator committee, has been watching the operations there closely for several days, and will be on hand all day today to show visitors around.

The principal point, that the committee wants to "put over" is that whatever else is done with tin cans, they should not be put in with the ashes. That is the only condition under which they cannot be put through the burner.

Burning the cans is essential, both in order to prevent their taking up so much space and to get rid of decaying matter attached to them which otherwise would create an unsanitary condition.

The incinerator staff previously has not been burning the cans, and a huge pile of them has accumulated, but now they are being burned successfully by dropping them into the south unit of the burner, which has the greatest amount of heat.

The result is that the burned cans take up only about one-eighth of the space that the whole cans did. Some material is still found impossible to burn; iron barrels and the like. Much of this is hauled away again by junk dealers, but some must still be buried.

Uniform System Of Accounting to Be Talked Today

A public hearing will be held here today in connection with a 1929 legislative enactment which provides for a uniform system of accounting for all political subdivisions of the state. The law makes it incumbent upon the secretary of state to prepare the uniform accounting plan.

Representatives of a large number of counties, cities, school districts and other political subdivisions of the state will attend the hearing. A tentative plan of accounting, as outlined by the secretary of state, will be presented at the hearing.

ARCHERY COURSE IS SCHEDULED AT W. U.

The department of women's physical training at Willamette university will offer instruction in archery this year, it was announced recently. The four classes in the university have donated funds for purchase of equipment, and it is expected that the bows, arrows and target will be put into use late next week.

Miss Alida G. Curry, director of women's physical training will give the instruction. Archery will not be a credit course in physical training, but will be an extra-curricular activity.

FRENCH CABINET IS NOT YET ORGANIZED

PARIS, Oct. 23.—(AP)—After a day of conferences between President Doumergue and leaders of every shade of French political opinion, France's 24 hour old cabinet crisis was still unresolved tonight.

The opinion of most close observers is that the formation of a new ministry to replace Aristide Briand's "cabinet of the hundred days" which has governed France since July 29, will be deferred until the end of the week.

Meanwhile President Doumergue is being urged by a number of his important visitors from different parties of the left centre and the left of the chamber of deputies to call M. Briand to form his twelfth ministry.

Whether the veteran of so many stormy political changes would consent is another matter.

M. Briand's friends declare he has finally decided to refuse any offer other than that of leading the portfolio of foreign affairs in someone else's cabinet.

The impression grew during day that M. Briand would be pretty sure to remain at the foreign ministry in any cabinet except one formed from groups on the right centre and the right.

Members of these groups have generally opposed his policy at the Hague reparations conference, and his views on early evacuation of the Rhineland and cessation of French rights in the Saar before 1935.

REMAINS OF MRS. IDA SAVAGE ARE SENT TO SALEM

Mrs. Ida Savage, daughter of Mrs. Nancy Flais of Salem and sister of Arthur Flais of Salem, died Tuesday in Port Townsend, Wash., and remains were shipped here last night for services and interment. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

QUARTER MILLION DAMAGES ASKED

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Murray Mdivani, motion picture actress, today filed suit in supreme court for \$250,000 damages against the Fox theatre corporation and three other companies.

She charged she injured her left foot when she stepped on some stage properties in an elevator at the Fox theatre, in Brooklyn on December 1, last, impairing her ability as a dancer.

The flatbush avenue and Nevins street corporation, Peter Clark, Inc., and the William Fox circuit of theatres are also named as defendants.

The actress, who is the wife of Prince Mdivani broke a bone in her left foot, and now has to wear wider shoes and lower heels, she said.
