

SELECT JUDGES FOR NATIONAL AUDITION

Prominent Folk in Music Chosen for Judges in Atwater Kent Contest

Both the president and the past president of the National Federation of Music Clubs, together with two grand opera singers, the president of the National Music League and an eminent editor and publicist have accepted service as members of the sponsorship committee, to supervise the finals of the third National Radio Audition which are to be held in New York and broadcast from coast to coast by the National Broadcasting Company, Sunday evening, December 15, at 9:15 p. m.

Announcement of the personnel of the National sponsorship committee was made by the Atwater Kent foundation of Philadelphia, together with the date of the finals for the thousands of young singers now competing throughout the country in local, state and district auditions that ten of their number may share in the final distribution of \$25,000 in cash awards and ten musical scholarships.

The committee includes Mrs. Elmer James Ottaway of Port Huron, Michigan, president of the National Federation of Music Clubs; Mrs. Edgar Stillman Kelley of Western College, Oxford, Ohio, immediate past president of the National Federation of Music Clubs; Mrs. Otto H. Kahn of New York City, president of the National Music League; Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink, contralto, with half a century of opera and concert service behind her; Mme. Louise Homer, contralto, one of the greatest of American opera and concert singers and Mr. Edward W. Bok, of Philadelphia, editor, author and publicist.

The third National Radio Audition has been in progress throughout the country since the latter part of May, and tens of thousands of ambitious young singers have competed in hundreds of communities during the summer and early fall. This month the local winners are competing in state auditions and next month the winners of these state tests will be heard in five geographical district competitions. Each district audition will select a young man and a young woman from the state champions to appear in New York December 15, and sing in the national finals where the best young man and best young woman singers in the United States will be determined upon.

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
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
