Mrs. Towns, who has been quite ill at a Salem hospital, has improved sufficiently to be moved to the home of her son, W. Flood.

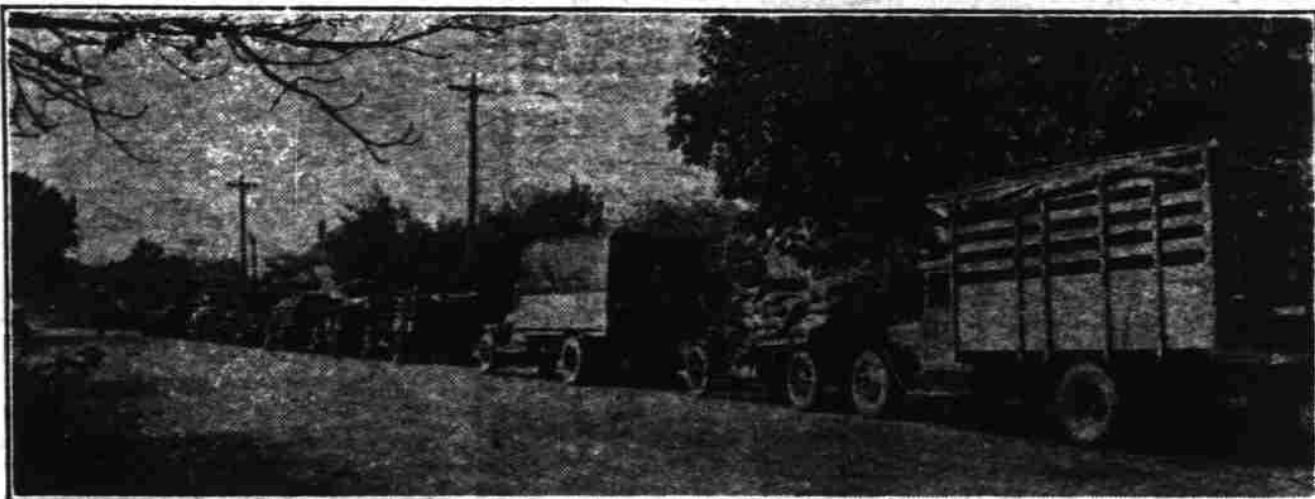
The Hill family who have lived in this community the past year moved to Seio this week.

RICKEY, Oct. 29.—The hunting season is with us again and every boy and man that can handle a gun and the dogs are having the time of their lives, hunting pheasants, while the women folks are worried nearly to death trying to protect the live things around on the farm.

If only the men folks would be more careful life would be so much more pleasant for the women during the hunting season.

If by chance one of the men gets a bird and the mother thinks she will enjoy a fried pheasant, her dinner is apt to be spoiled before she even gets a bite by a bombardment of shots and she has to run to see if some one has shot the prize hen, the old sander, the family cow, or even one of the family.

In this community there lives an old man in very poor health and is unable to work, who has a flock of sheep which he enjoys tending. As this old man is alone, a great deal of the time, a neighbor lady watches for him to see if he is all right and on days that he is not able to look after his sheep tells him how many she has seen that day.

A few days ago a young man came along, stopped his car, jump-

ed over the old man's fence, had his gun raised and was just ready to shoot at a bird when this neighbor woman rushed frantically out of the house and called to him that the farm was posted, as it was the quickest thing she could say. He was so far away for the woman to tell him all the details and was very nice about leaving, but no doubt in his mind he was calling the woman an "old hen" or even something worse, for he certainly wanted that bird badly.

He did not know it, but that woman may have saved him from taking a man's life. He did not know that just a few minutes before this woman had seen the old man in the pasture and did not know but what he was still in the brush, nor that behind some brush toward which he was aiming his gun another man was working.

One consolation is that there are only a few more days left of the hunting season and then what men folks that are not crippled, will hang up the shot guns and go back to work and the women will have a whole year to make friends of the enemies they have made during the hunting season, trying to protect the family and livestock.
