### AMERICAN RADIOS BEST SAYS EUROPE

That the superiority of American radio has reached to European countries, is evidenced by the fact that just as soon as the Graf Zeppelin landed at Lakehurst, Max Pruss, the famous navigator of the Graf, got in touch with the New York office of the Grigsby-Grunow company in regard to placing a Majestic set on board for the craft's world tour. After returning to Germany, it will be installed in his home in Friedrichshafen. The latest model was delivered to Pruss a few hours before sailing by Gil Poore of the Majestic company.

It is an interesting fact that Mr. Pruss has been aboard the Graf Zeppelin on every occasion this great air liner has taken the air. He was the navigator on board the Los Angeles on her trip from Germany to America.

In an interview with Captain Knute Eckener, he enthusiastically praised the performance of the Majestic radio, which he is now using in his home in Friedrichshafen, Germany. Captain Eckener said: "The Majestic radio, which I took with me on board the Graf Zeppelin on our last trip to America has performed beautifully, and I consider it a truly remarkable set. I have received most of the European stations within a range of 1000 miles."

Captain Eckener showed great interest in the late model Majestic, and it was because of his enthusiasm that Pruss desired a Majestic for his own use at his home in Friedrichshafen. Mr. Poore, who made the trip from New York to Lakehurst with the Majestic set for Pruss, was taken aboard the Graf and shown the intricacies of the huge air liner and discussed at length with the captain the world tour.

A great many of the features incorporated in an American radio and to which the listener in this country is quite accustomed, are not available in sets of European manufacture. Here we are accustomed to the complete reproduction of the super dynamic speaker, the volume handling ability of detection and push-pull amplifiers, and the quietness assured by the type 27 heated tubes. Foreign makers still have much to learn along these lines and how to incorporate these features into sets at moderate prices. Mass produc-

tion such as that of Grigsby-Grunow company, making possible the finest in radio at less than \$200, is unknown across the Atlantic. The newly formed Grigsby-Grunow (England) Ltd. will probably rectify that situation within the next few months.

### SENATOR WATSON TO REST 3 WEEKS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Worn out by the tariff struggle in the senate, Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican leader, will leave Washington Thursday or Friday for a three weeks rest in Florida.

Senator Jones, of Washington, the assistant floor leader, will take over the helm for the republicans in his absence. The Washington senator is just recovering from a serious operation, but he reported he would carry on.

Friends of Watson disclosed today that he had been under the care of physicians for more than a week although he has been present in the senate daily. The doctors declared him to be on the verge of a nervous breakdown.

Watson made known his decision today to his colleagues and conferees were called. With the party busy on the tariff bill, some concern is felt over his departure.

### BURTON RITES ARE OBSERVED

#### Washington Officialdom is On Hand to Pay Solon Its Respects

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—President Hoover joined members of the supreme court, the senate and the house in honoring the memory of Theodore E. Burton today at a funeral service in the senate chamber, where, the late Ohio senator lay in state prior to being taken to Cleveland for burial.

Sorrowful quiet pervaded the distinguished group who heard eulogies pronounced by Senator Fess of Ohio and Representative Hawley of Oregon, friends of Mr. Burton throughout his service

both in the senate and house. The president sat with bowed head at arm's length from the flower bedecked silver casket while Mrs. Hoover looked on from a seat in the members gallery.

**High Officials Are On Hand in Group**  
Grouped around him were the members of his official family, Chief Justice Taft and Associate Justices of the supreme court, members of the diplomatic corps and the commanding officers of the army, navy, and marine corps.

Behind the executive, and filling the large chamber, were the senators and representatives, among them two women, Representatives Ruth Bryan Owen of Florida and Florence P. Kahn of California.

As rain pattered gently on the windowed roof of the chamber, Vice-President Curtis turned the service over to the Rev. Z. B. Phillips, chaplain of the senate, and the Rev. James Shera Montgomery, chaplain of the house.

**Members of Family Bow Heads in Sorrow**

Beside the casket, heads bowed in sorrow, sat the immediate members of the family—his niece, Miss Grace Burton, the dead senator's official hostess during many of the years of his stay in Washington; William Burton, of Omaha, Nebraska, a nephew; Burton Liese, a grand-nephew, and Mrs. Laura Price, of Chicago, another niece, and Mrs. Elizabeth Price Hassell, of Washington, a grand-niece.

Both Senator Fess and Representative Hawley were unstinted in their praise of Senator Burton, and drew from their long contact with him intimate touches of the events, both national and international, in which he was one of the leading figures of his time.

### WORKINGS OF PHONE SERVICE RECOUNTED

An insight into the "how" of the telephone exchange was told to the Zonta club Wednesday noon by Miss Hazel Cook, chief operator for the local office. By far the biggest problem which confronts the chief operator—who has charge of the office force and who is responsible for the service rendered—is the personnel side of the hello business, Miss Cook told her fellow club women.

It is no easy matter to get the right type of girl, to show her how to tend the switchboard and further, to make her want to do it, Miss Cook said. Learning is the most discouraging part of the business, she has concluded as a result of her own experience, both as beginner and now to the top as chief operator. Selection and training of the su-

pervisors who work immediately under her are also knotty problems she confronts and works with.

Each operator at the local exchange handles from 250 to 300 calls an hour, Miss Cook told the Zontas. The peak of traffic, while usual between 9 and 12 o'clock in the morning, frequently, varies. Often the operators are busiest between 2 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Miss Cook told the club members of her start in the telephone business and of the progressive steps upward. She came here less than a year ago from Portland.
