

FORMER OREGON RESIDENT DIES

Sybil Wilson Givens Passes Away in Los Angeles Home

FALLS CITY, Nov. 7.—Sybil Amelia Wilson Givens died in Los Angeles, California, November 2, 1929. Funeral services were held Wednesday, November 6 and interment made in Forest Lawn cemetery, Los Angeles. She is survived by her widower, Clyde T. Givens, of Seattle, Washington, who was with her in California; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Sylvia Brinsfield, of Seattle; her foster mother, Mrs. Lydia K. Ford and foster sister, Mrs. Nellie Sears, of Falls City; a foster brother, J. R. Ford of Eugene.

Sybil Amelia Wilson was born at Eddyville, Oregon, April 14, 1896, the daughter of William Wilson and Ella Benson Wilson. With the passing of her father, when she was two weeks old and her mother when she was five, Sybil was left alone and at the mother's death she became the foster daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Ford, then residing near Bridgeport.

She attended school there until 1911, when the family came to Falls City to reside, and then attended the schools here until her graduation from high school in 1917. She was a teacher in the Falls City schools the following year. During the 1918 vacation, Sybil, who was ambitious for a college education, travelled over Oregon and Washington, selling books to help swell the college fund. Later she attended the normal school in San Jose, California, graduating from that institution, and afterward attended Berkeley college. Following one year's teaching in Pendleton, Sybil went to Los Angeles, where she was an instructor in music and art until compelled by poor health to give up the work.

Mrs. Givens spent part of 1927 in the tubercular sanitarium and was discharged as cured in June, 1928. A recurrence of this disease in the winter of 1928-29 was caused by influenza and was the cause of her death.

Sybil Amelia Wilson and Clyde T. Givens were married in Seattle, Washington, Oct. 15, 1928. When fourteen years of age Sybil became a member of the Methodist church and was active in the work during the rest of her lifetime. She was cheerful and kindly, giving freely of her time and musical talents for the pleasure of others, beloved by all who knew her. She was an accomplished musician, playing both piano and pipe organ, and was working and planning to continue her musical career. Playing for piano, concert at the Ambassador hotel in Los Angeles was one of her later engagements, which helped her in her plans for a musical career.

The present plans, according to officials, are to start logging operations as soon as the construction work is completed and to have logs brought down as soon as possible so that a long winter chow down will not be necessary at the mill.

Work in the woods ceased last summer when the forest fires burned out a number of bridges on logging spurs.
