

CANNON FIRING RUINS FISHING

Packers Association Obtain
Cancellation of Lease on
Clatsop Spit

Target practice by the Oregon national guard and artillery units of the regular army off Clatsop Spit in the mouth of the Columbia river, has ruined the fishing possibilities in those waters, according to W. L. Thompson of Portland, president of the Columbia River Packers' association, who appeared before the state land board here Tuesday and asked that a lease of the fishing grounds held by the association be canceled.

Thompson said that the season for target practice comes during the summer, and that fishermen have refused to risk being blown into the water by shells from the cannons on shore. The lease was canceled.

The lease entered into between the state and the packers association provided for an annual rental of \$1500 a year. Under the terms of the lease the packers paid \$1500 for 1929, and posted a bond covering the rental for 1930. It was agreed between Thompson and the state land board that the \$1500 rental for 1930 would be forfeited to the state. Thompson contended that the association had paid the state \$3000 and had not received any return for its investment.

At the time the lease was executed Governor Patterson recommended that the association be required to post a bond for only one year in advance. Because of this, the board decided that it was within its rights in canceling the lease. Had the bond covered the entire five years this could not have been done.

Thompson said he had requested the government to desist from target practice off the spit, but had received a reply to the effect that this could not be done because the waters were part of the federal proving grounds.

It was said that the action of the land board would affect the leases of other packers.

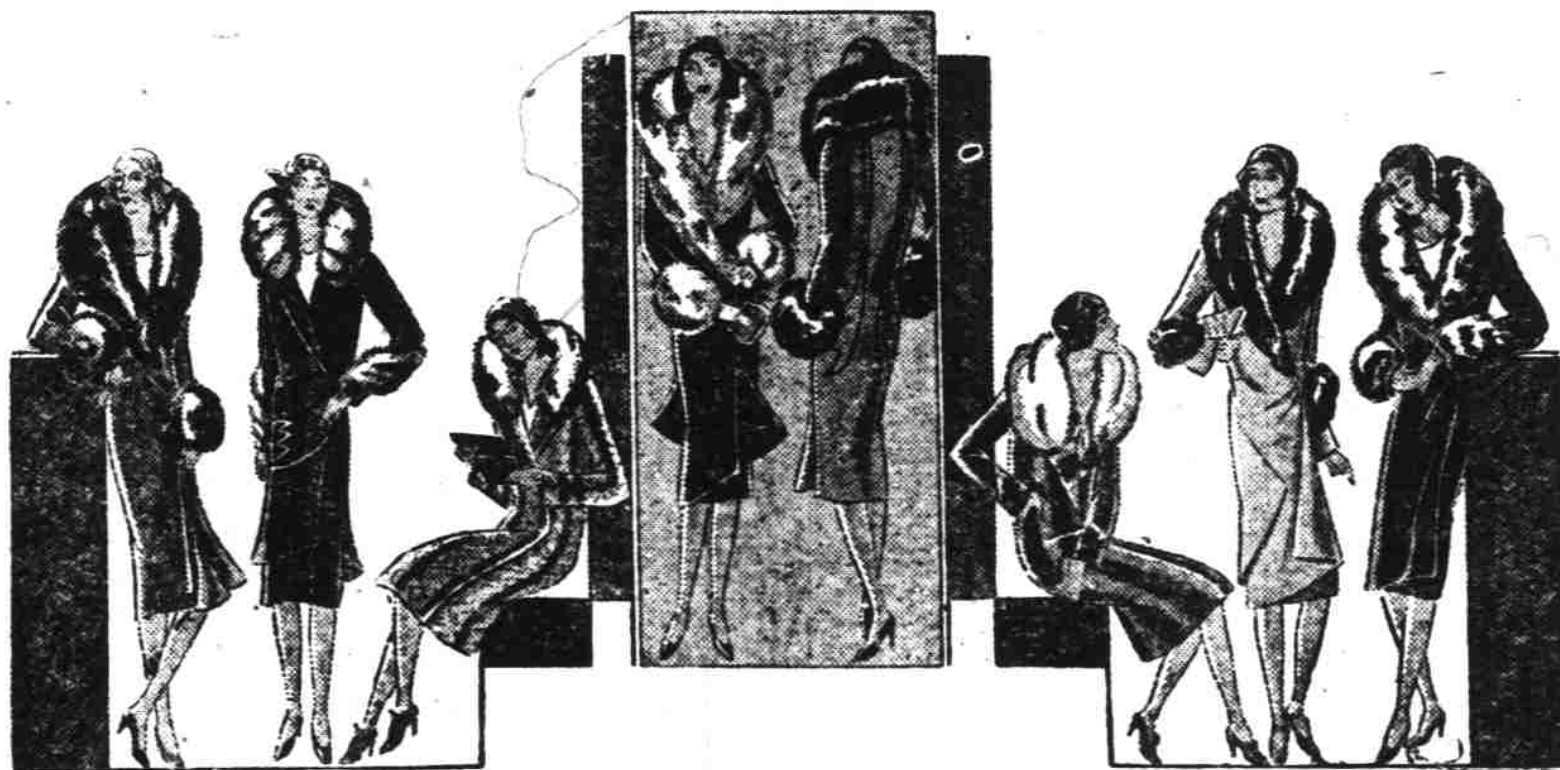
