JOHN WESTLEY, 76, CALLED BY DEATH

John Westley, 76 years old and a resident of Salem vicinity for 54 years, died Wednesday afternoon about 2 o'clock at his home near Chemawa.

Mr. Westley came here from Tennessee, which state was his birthplace. He was married to Miss Nancy Elizabeth Alderman, a daughter of one of the earliest pioneer couples of the northwest. Baker bay, near the mouth of the Columbia on the Washington side, is named for one of her relatives.

For 16 years Mr. Westley was employed at the Chemawa Indian school. He was recognized among orchardists all over the Willamette valley as an expert, and his advice was frequently sought. He planted one of the first prune orchards in the valley, on the farm of Dr. Reynolds, a Salem pioneer.

Mr. Westley is survived by his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Al Haldean of San Diego and Mrs. John A. Evans of Salem; and four sons, William A. Westley of San Francisco, Roy R. Westley of Salem and Elmer E. Westley of Astoria.

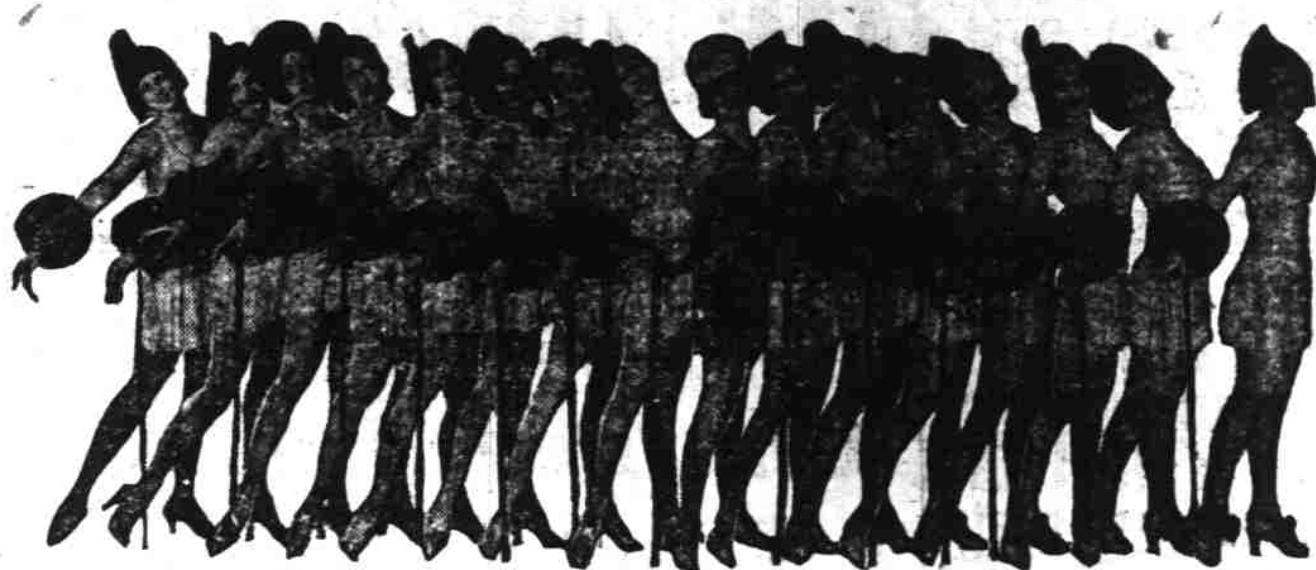
Funeral services had not been arranged Wednesday night, but it was expected that interment would be in the Hayesville cemetery. The body is at the Clough-Taylor mortuary.

FAMOUS DIPLOMAT WILL RETIRE SOON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—One of the most prominent of America's career diplomats will pass from the foreign service with the retirement shortly of William Phillips, of Boston, as minister to Canada.

Phillips' resignation was accepted by President Hoover after the assignment of another diplomat to a ministerial post. He declined to accept another post. He asked to be relieved of his duties in order to afford his children an education in the United States.

The White House later announced the assignment of another equally prominent career diplomat to a ministerial post. Nelson T. Johnson, of New Kirk, Oklahoma, assistant secretary in charge of far eastern affairs, was appointed minister to China to succeed John Van A. MacMurray, whose resignation was announced recently.

Belanger replaces George Courtney, of Oklahoma City, who was forced out of the fight with an infected toe.

COOS BAY SEEKING IMPROVED HARBOR

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 13. —(AP)—The port of Coos Bay today dispatched a request to W. C. Hawley, representative, to secure an amendment to the rivers and harbors bill authorizing the United States army engineers to make a preliminary examination and survey of Coos Bay with a view of deepening and widening the inner harbor.

The project is to be created by the port and paid out of local funds to the extent of \$120,000 contingent upon the approval of the project by the government and an increase of the annual maintenance from \$30,000 to \$50,000 yearly.

LA FOLLETT GETS TEN MORE MONTHS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13. —(AP)—Aggregate sentences of 12 months hanging over Charles R. LaFollett, state representative from Washington county, for alleged offenses growing out of domestic troubles, were increased to 22 months today when Circuit Judge John Stevenson sentenced the legislator to 10 months in jail on a non-support charge. He was convicted last week by a jury after a trial lasting several days.

Counsel for LaFollett made an effort to delay the passing of sentence by filing a motion for a stay of judgment and announcing their intent to move the court for a new trial.

Judge Stevenson asked the defendant if he was ready to enter into a bond guaranteeing to support his family, consisting of his wife, Mary, and four children, who have been living here since last March. LaFollett refused to accept the offer and sentence was pronounced.

LaFollett was recently sentenced to six months in jail by Circuit Judge Walter Evans on a contempt charge resulting from the legislator's having refused to pay support money and another six months was added by Presiding Circuit Judge Robert Tucker on a contempt charge for failing to pay suit money in accordance with the court's order.
