

RAIL HEARING IS CONTINUED

Great Northern and Western Pacific Pile Up Data For New Line

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—In a long and tedious session into which was crowded multifarious and voluminous testimony covering a wide area of the Great Northern and Western Pacific railroads today continued presentation of the claims on which they base their application for a 200 mile connecting rail line in northeastern California.

Tonight their case was still incomplete with indications that another two days might be required to finish it. This despite efforts on the part of Charles D. Mahaffie, director of finance for the Interstate Commerce commission, presiding to eliminate all inconsequential testimony.

Witnesses at this afternoon's session included C. L. Gardiner, consulting engineer of Portland, Ore., and J. F. Bon, general freight agent for the Western Pacific.

Gardiner's testimony pertained to a survey made by him of the existing industrial and agricultural pursuits in the area involved. He declared timber to be the principal product with 37,500,000,000 feet available, grazing (sheep and cattle) he said was the second industry in importance.

Out of 205,000 acres of agricultural land involved he said, only 60,000 acres are now developed. This he attributed to lack of transportation facilities.

Repeated protests on the part of Attorney E. J. Foulds for the Southern Pacific that the witness was not qualified to state what effect the proposed new line would have on agricultural development were as repeatedly sustained by Mahaffie, who declared the witness "obviously does not understand the question."

Foulds' request that he be given until tomorrow morning to prepare cross-examination of Gardiner was granted.

Bon presented a great mass of prepared exhibits on all phases of freight traffic actual and potential which he declared would be available to the two lines if the application is granted.

Bode K. Smith, passenger traffic manager for the Western Pacific, in estimating the amount of local passenger business over the proposed new line said that 57,600 passengers would be handled in and out of Westwood during the first year of operation.

This traffic Smith estimated would produce a revenue of \$9.00 per passenger. He estimated that all of this business would be diverted from the Southern Pacific and could be handled by existing lines without difficulty.

House. The secretary recognized his chief and made a feeble effort to acknowledge his appreciation. He lapsed into unconsciousness quickly, however, and Mr. Hoover presently departed.

Mrs. Hoover remained at the White House.

Another consultation of physicians was ordered. It was to begin as soon as Dr. John M. Finney, Johns Hopkins specialist on genito-urinary diseases could arrive from Baltimore.

The calling of this physician was taken to mean that because of the unusual type of operation which was necessary there had developed serious complications.

The visit of the president to his war secretary provided a touching scene from which Mr. Hoover's closest associates withdrew to leave them entirely alone.

Secret Service Man Accompanies President

The president entered the sick room with a secret service man. In the room also were only Colonel William L. Keller, chief of the Walter Reed staff, and Lieutenant Commander Joel T. Boone, White House physician.

"How are you, my dear friend," the president, saluted his cabinet official as he walked into the room.

The secretary's answer was lost to the president; it was so faint.

Then Keller, Boone, and Jervis retired and the two remained alone for several minutes.

President Hoover was visibly affected when he left the sick room believing that he might have looked upon his close friend and associate for the last time.

revival of construction, the stimulation of exports and of other legitimate business expansion, especially to take such action in concert with the use of our new powers to assist agriculture.

As a prelude to President Hoover's announcement, a vast amount of preliminary work and study had been instituted. Washington officials tonight were not prepared to reveal the extent of this since much of the subject matter will remain for the conference itself to confirm after assembly.

One branch of the preparatory enterprise has involved a survey of the entire field of public construction susceptible of being undertaken in the United States next year by the federal government, state governments, and localities.

It is understood that the work of investigating this line of possible effort has been done partly by the commerce department and partly by a standing committee on the business cycle organized several years ago by the president when secretary of commerce and including in its membership economists of standing and industrial leaders.

Julius Brames is Among Hoover's Visitors

While nothing has been said at the White House in recent days of the conferences held by the president, it was recalled tonight

that among the business leaders who have been there were Julius Brames, chairman of the board of the United States chamber of commerce; Adolph Lewisohn, New York, banker and Henry J. Pierce, president of several subsidiaries of the Electric Bond and Share Co.

Of the government officials, the president has had extended talks lately with Secretary Mellon and Undersecretary Mills of the treasury; Roy A. Young, governor general of the federal reserve board; and Chairman Legge, of the farm board. Mathew Woll, of the American Federation of labor, also called recently.

The personnel of the conference group is expected to be announced within a few days, and the meeting will take place in the middle of next week.

BOSTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The U. S. S. Marblehead, light cruiser commanded by Captain Ralph A. The Evansville escaped without serious injury and continued on to New York after the crash. None of the crews was injured.

PAULINE B. LEABO OF SALEM PASSES

Pauline B. Leabo, widow of the late Augustus C. Leabo, died Friday night at the family residence at 1830 Court street after an illness dating from last Monday, when she suffered a stroke. Prior to that time Mrs. Leabo had been most active, particularly in work of the Woman's Relief Corps of which she was a member. Her husband, who died here July 18, 1925, was a Civil War veteran.

Mrs. Leabo was born in Clermont county, Ohio, and with her husband came to Salem nearly 40 years ago. They lived here for some time, later moving to southern Oregon and again coming here ten years ago from Oakland, Oregon. She was a member of the First Methodist church.

Surviving relatives include two children: Mrs. A. G. Hallin, of Salem and R. H. Leabo of Portland; six grandchildren: A. W. King, of Sacramento; R. L. King, of Bellingham; H. M. Hallin of Portland; Mrs. J. Donagan of Sheridan and Gwendolyn Hallin and Reas Hallin of Salem; also eight great grandchildren.

Remains are at the Rigdon mortuary and funeral arrangements have not yet been made, however it is expected the services will be Monday. Interment will be in the Lee Mission cemetery, where Mr. Leabo is buried.

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TARIFF RATES UPON TOMATOES BOOSTED

The rate on cherries thus approved is two cents a pound on cherries in their natural state or frozen without sugar added, six cents on dried, discolored or evaporated cherries, five and one-half cents on cherries sulphured or in brine; nine and one-half cents on cherries with stems or pits removed.

The bill also carries an amendment agreed to Friday morning providing a rate of five and one-half cents and 40 per cent ad valorem, on maraschino candied, crystallized or glace cherries, or those frozen with sugar added or prepared or preserved in any manner.

The cherry tariff increase thus assured will mean much to the industry in the Salem vicinity, it was stated Friday by Max Gehlhar, who has been a leader in the program of the Salem Cherry Growers association to bring this about, as it will permit the substitution of cherries grown here for the small varieties now imported from southern Europe for the maraschino trade.

The increase on pitted and stemmed cherries is also a boon, as it will give the necessary differential over those stemmed and pitted by cheap European labor.

Miles McKey Is Given Rank of Lieut. Colonel

Miles McKey, assistant attorney general, Friday received word from the war department that he has been promoted from the rank of major in the coast artillery to that of lieutenant colonel.

McKey served in the national guard for six years preceding the world war, and later was in service at the Presidio, where he was a members of the officers reserve corps. He always has taken an active interest in military affairs.

Convict Kills Self by Use of Sheet in Cell

Jack Porter, 25, who was serving a two years term in the state penitentiary here for burglary, committed suicide Friday by hanging himself in his cell with a sheet. Porter was received at the prison October 4, 1928, and would have been released early next year. He was committed from Marion county. Porter's mother, who lives at Spokane, Wash., was notified.
