

BYRD RETURNS TO OWN BASE

Much Territory Surveyed by American Explorer on Extended Flight

ed in all the tests to which the planes destined for the Byrd Antarctic expedition were subjected.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The outcome of the dash by Commander Richard E. Byrd for the south pole was watched in the capital today from five distinct points—the human, the scientific, international, spectacular and aeronautical.

Brother Tom Awaits Reports With Interest

The explorer's brother Tom, of the Tom, Dick and Harry Byrd trio, the last named being governor of Virginia, led Washington's watchers to direct interest. His emotions prevailed too at the White House and among the men on the street.

Diplomats watched Byrd's efforts believing they might give rise to the question of title to lands in the ice-locked Antarctic. First to come, however, might be the work of the map makers, who visualize a chance to draw more lines upon the globe.

In aviation quarters success by Byrd would mean valuable knowledge in aeronautical construction, navigation and the capacities of ships to perform under severe conditions.

Those both in official and private life saw the spectacular side of the 10,000 mile dash over frozen wastes as an area where no resources were known to give aid to the explorers, and where failure was probable.

The National Geographic society, a sponsor and counsel in addition to all quarters of the globe and which cooperated with Byrd, looked to his flight for further commendation of the sun-compass. Use of this instrument is credited by Byrd with a large share in the success of his north polar flight, and six were carried to the southern area. It was invented by the society's chief cartographer, Albert H. Bumstead.

of a president. The Mercury told how President Grant entered the office of Mr. Sumner, and addressed him as chairman of the judiciary committee. He should have been addressed as chairman of the committee on foreign affairs.

The Oregon militia, according to newspapers found in the cornerstones, had a total of 16,871 men. Of these 1778 were from Marion county.

The old Weekly Democratic Press, a Salem publication, deposited in the cornerstone one of its papers printed a year before the cornerstone celebration. It gave the returns of the election in which the democratic slate was successful.

Its headline read: "Oregon Democratic! Every Department of Government Redeemed; Governor, legislature, and supreme court, George H. Williams re-elected. Federal dictation spurned. Let white freedom rejoice."

That some members of the congregation of the Portland Methodist church, had acquired the habit of spitting tobacco juice on the floor of the sanctuary, was indicated in a resolution found in the book of minutes of the church, and later printed in the Daily Oregon Herald of Portland.

It read: "We, the undersigned, believing that the use of tobacco in church, by spitting the amber on the floor and disgracing the house, is a nuisance to a majority of the congregation, dishonors God's Temple, and is a filthy practice we would not tolerate in our own home, respectfully request the Rev. . . pastor of the church, to ask those who so thoughtless as to be guilty of this indecency to abstain from the use of tobacco while in the Methodist Episcopal church of this place."

State officials at the time of placing the cornerstone were: L. E. Grover, governor; S. F. Chadwick, secretary of state; L. Felschner, state treasurer; Syl C. Simpson, librarian; T. Patterson, state printer.

The prison building commissioners were William Watkins, superintendent; J. Holman, and A. McAlexander. G. W. Rhodes was architect and M. F. Rhaw, plumber.

With developments toward peace on her extreme northern border, China's nationalist government gave further attention to quelling the civil war in her southern provinces of Kwangtung and Kwangsi, which has threatened the great city of Canton.

Rebel Troops Are Bombed by Nationalists

Nationalist planes dropped bombs upon rebel troops along the Kwangtung border and it was reported that President Chiang Kai-Shek planned to go from Nanking to Canton to take personal command of his troops, of whom 70,000 were reported available.

Central China bandits who took advantage of disturbed conditions to kidnap Mrs. Oscar Hellestad, an American missionary, from her home at Sinyeh, Hunan province, Thursday, released her after a few hours. The Rev. Ulrich Kroustsen of Calumet, Mich., who was abducted from the Franciscan mission at Wuchang early this month, was still held by bandits who demanded \$3,000 gold ransom.

SEARCH REDOUBLED FOR BASSETT BODY

SEATTLE, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Search for the body of James Eugene Bassett, former Annapolis, Md., missing since September, 1928, will be concentrated tomorrow on a lonely, wooded canyon just north of Bothell, Wash. Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin announced here tonight.

The canyon is well within the area which Colvin contends was revealed to him as the hiding place of the supposedly missing body of Decastio Earl Mayer, a suspect in the case, while undergoing tests with a lie detector machine.

The prosecutor said his attention was directed to the canyon by a secret investigation which he conducted today. He said a number of persons had told him of seeing a person they thought was Mayer in the vicinity about the time of Bassett's disappearance.

Arrangements were made with Snohomish county officials to provide met to augment the detail of King county deputy sheriffs and marines who engaged in a futile search for Bassett's body in the vicinity of Bothell today.

WOMAN CONFESSES MURDERING SPOUSE

DURANT, Okla., Nov. 29.—(AP)—A love pact, in which the mother of three and the father of eight children agreed to kill their respective spouses, was alleged in a confession made to county authorities here today by Mrs. Ila Hughes, against who a murder charge was prepared immediately afterward in connection with the killing of her husband, Will Hughes, last Tuesday night.

She named as her alleged accomplice, A. J. Eastep, whose home adjoined the Hughes farm near Utica, in Bryan county, asserting that, upon a pre-arranged signal from Eastep, she lured her husband to a barn where Eastep clubbed him to death with a motor car spindle. Eastep, who is held at the state prison at McAlester, also has been charged with murder.

Mrs. Hughes declared also that Eastep had informed her in October that he would poison his wife and that Mrs. Eastep died three days later.

County authorities have ordered the woman's body disinterred and her viscera examined for poison.

Officers said Hughes carried \$1,500 life insurance and that Eastep had collected \$1,000 in- surance which he had taken out on his wife's life.
