Someday who looked like the old "Sis Hopkins" but who goes by the name of Jean McDonald, walked out on the Fox Elsinore stage Saturday night and proceeded to do a comedy dance that was worth being amused about. The dance itself wasn't intricate nor particularly clever but Miss McDonald's facial expression and body contortions made her act a good one.

Two other acts stood out for being different—Myrtle Gordon, who did a solo act of two songs—one hard-boiled and the other unusual on the stage just now; it attempted real dramatic interpretation and in giving it real tears trickled down the attractive young lady's face. Rather gave one a start—tears on the stage just now are as unusual as clouds.

And the other act was John-ny Planks, and it was so good that the audience wanted him back. That is something Salem audiences are rather slow to ask. Plank's act was whistling. The whole program is good—not much dialogue but much comedy acting. One can do without a lot of the dialogue that is presented, and good silent comedy acting is rare. The tap dancing chorus is excellent. It danced up stairs and over chairs with ease and grace and beautiful rhythm.

"Oh Yeah" the picture feature is amusing. From the sound of the laughs it is a man's show. The cast is good but Zasu Pitts has to be heard to be appreciated.

## CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE IS STARTED

The annual Christmas seal sale is under way in Marion county, with committee members over the county under direction of Miss Mary Fike and in Salem under direction of Mrs. E. E. Ling working hard to make the highest goal in the history of the sale.

In Marion county last year the income from the sale of Christmas seals assisted in carrying some message of health to 10,792 persons in an attempt to help eradicate tuberculosis by improving the general health of the people. Two hundred and twenty-five tuberculosis patients received nursing visits in their homes. The seals last year paid a part of the salary of a county nurse and this year will pay the full salary of a nurse, which will be the share of the Marion County Public Health association in the large program of health for Marion county.

## VESSEL AGROUND; MEN GOING ASHORE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Meager wireless dispatches today told of the wreck and preparations by its crew of 34 to abandon the British steamship Norwich City, ashore on Gardner Island, one of the Phoenix group, about 1800 miles southwest of Honolulu.

First word of the disaster to the freighter, traveling in ballast from Melbourne, Australia, to Honolulu came in a wireless ap-pearance from the freighter as it was driven on the reefs. The message said:

"SOS. Ashore on Gardner Island. Going fast."

Then electrical disturbance became so intense, MacKay Radio and Telegraph company messages from its Honolulu offices stated, that all further efforts to communicate were balked. At 8 o'clock the powerful navy radio reached Apia and received this report:

"We are unable to ascertain the exact condition, but the vessel cannot last much longer. Think all on board will be able to make shore."

## FIERCE COLD WAVE SWEEPS HUGE AREA

The first severe cold wave of the season, which has swept over the United States from the Rocky mountains to the Atlantic seaboard and from the northwest far down into the heart of Dixie entered upon its third day today.

Freezing weather, and in some sections, sub-zero temperatures and heavy snow were reported in all parts of the country except the far southwestern and extreme southern states and the Pacific coast.

Stiff, bitter gales accompanied the cold wave along the Atlantic coast and the entire east had its first general subfreezing weather, snow fell as far south as Virginia. Ice blasts descended into parts of the southern states and unseasonably low temperatures were registered in Georgia, Arkansas and the Carolinas.

## BOOZE COUNT FILED AFTER CAR CRASHES

Foggy atmosphere coupled with a few drinks of canned heat is said to have been the cause of an accident near Sunnyside shortly after 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon when a light coupe plunged off the Pacific highway and injured George M. Pullmer of Philadelphia, Penn., to such extent that he was taken to the hospital here by ambulance.

Two companions riding in the machine with Pullmer were not injured but were arrested on an intoxication charge by state traffic officers who arrived on the scene shortly after the mishap.

Pullmer's attendants at the Deaconess hospital declared that the internal injuries suffered by the man were not serious, although he was suffering considerable pain at a late hour last night.

pany's plans in connection with this permanent improvement.

The public service commission, according to Chairman Miller, was particularly interested in whether the plant would be of sufficient capacity to take care of future needs.

Prof. W. F. Langlier, consulting engineer for the company, explained that it would have a normal capacity of six million gallons a day and that nine million gallons could be handled if necessary without any expansion of the plant. In addition, there is room for doubling the number of filter units, while the pipes, fumes, and coagulation and sedimentation units already have a 15 million gallon capacity.

The normal demand here is 2 1/2 million gallons and the peak demand seven million.
