

W. O. W. APPEAL NOT ALLOWED

Insurance Commissioner to
Keep Hands Off Until
Courts Decide

Oregon assessment holders of life insurance policies in the Woodmen of the World who have protested against the proposed new legal reserve rates of the organization, can expect no relief until such time as the issues have been finally determined in the courts.

This was the reply of Clare A. Lee, state insurance commissioner, to a resolution adopted by a group of the assessment members urging the Oregon commissioner to enforce in this state a decree handed down in favor of the members by a court in Colorado. A letter accompanying the resolution signed by F. C. Coulter, secretary of the group, and Dan Kellaher, both of Portland, was addressed to both Governor Patterson and Mr. Lee.

The Colorado court sought to compel the Woodmen of the World to eliminate all members who have dropped out since the organization changed over a legal reserve rate, cancel all policies written since the change and provide new policies according to the old rates.

"Information obtained in this office," read Lee's letter, "is to enforce a decree or judgment after it has been stayed on appeal is contempt of the appellate court. Obviously, then, a state department can take no action when the subject as related in your resolution is before the court and on appeal in this manner."

"You may rest assured that when the case is finally settled by the court that this department will be guided accordingly. We are in hopes that the question will be settled legally and expeditiously."

FALSE REPORTS ARE HURTING CAMPAIGN

Sale of Christmas seals in Salem is lagging, largely due to erroneous report that 60 cents of each dollar collected and kept in Marion county is spent for salaries and campaign expenses, Miss Mary Fake, county chairman, reported following an executive committee meeting, in which Mrs. T. J. Brabec, chairman of the mail sale, reported approximately a third of the stamps mailed out were being returned.

Miss Fake issued the following statement following the executive meeting: "No salaries are paid and all campaign materials come from the state association. The only expense for the sale is for office incidentals for routine work in contacting workers throughout the county and the expense of sending out the letters through the mail. All workers in the county are giving generously of their time to make the sale a success. The 60 per cent mentioned above may be kept here if nine seals per capita are sold and all of it will go into health service."

efforts to eradicate tuberculosis. The comparison of three years in the statistics on tuberculosis in this county shows plainly what the public health work is doing in this county. In 1925 there were 78 cases reported and 28 deaths. In 1928 there were 48 cases reported and 21 deaths. With the opening of 30 cases, the health education work shows preventive methods are effective.

The Oregon State association receives 35 per cent of each dollar and the National association only five per cent. These two associations furnish all plans and materials for carrying on the work.

The reports coming in from the county are satisfactory. Through a personal visit to 39 of the rural schools, Mrs. J. H. Thompson reported much enthusiasm aroused. Many other schools are reached through the local workers in each district. Calls are coming in for more seals to sell. Chemawa Indian school has called for 2000 seals four times, making a total of \$80.00 in the school alone.

W. E. CRABTREE HAS ARTICLE PUBLISHED

SILVERTON, Dec. 7.—In the current issue of the Agricultural Digest, a national publication devoted to the interest of agriculture in the United States, Warren E. Crabtree has two feature articles.

The first of these gives the author's views of the relation of the farmer to marketing. The article sketches the accomplishments of Eldon Fox, 4-H club work and Smith Hughes work at Silverton. It is entitled "Send a Prize to the Country" and refers to the prize which Eldon Fox of Silverton sent Mr. Coulidge some time ago.

The work of Mr. Crabtree as an author is well known here as he has had a number of articles published in national magazines, particularly in the agricultural field. Mr. Crabtree has also had a number of photographs of his published in The Saturday Evening Post.

Mr. Crabtree is head of the local Smith-Hughes department, one of the best equipped departments of its sort in the state.

HEARING BEGINS ON DISBARMENT

State Hall of Representatives
Scene of Legal
Controversy

Hearing of the disbarment proceeding filed by Thomas Mannix against George W. Joseph will get under way in the hall of representatives here Monday. The disbarment proceedings filed by Joseph against Mannix will be heard later in the week.

The house of representatives resembles a court chamber, with accommodations provided for the referees, witnesses, attorneys, prosecutors and spectators. The referees, who include Circuit Judges G. F. Skipworth of Lane county, H. D. Norton of Jackson county and Fred Wilson of Wasco county, probably will occupy seats behind the speaker's desk on the rostrum. Judge Skipworth will preside, and bailiffs will be on duty to keep order.

Marion County Man One of Prosecutors

Prosecutors appointed by the supreme court in the Mannix-Joseph case include District Attorney John Carson of Marion county, Oscar Hayter of Dallas, and W. Lair Thompson of Portland. Evam Reames of Medford, Arthur Clark of Corvallis and Arthur McMahon of Albany will serve as prosecutors in the case brought by Joseph against Mannix. Attorneys indicated that more than a week would be required to dispose of the two proceedings.

Mannix alleged in his complaint that Joseph had attempted to intimidate the supreme court by causing to be published in a Portland newspaper articles reflecting on certain members of the court. It was also charged by Joseph that Mannix had attempted to corrupt Justice McBride through the use of liquor.

Joseph Fires Broadside Against Mr. Mannix

Joseph, in his complaint against Mannix, alleges improper business relations with Justice Rand, in connection with litigation growing out of the E. Henry Wempe will

contest. It was also charged by Joseph that Mannix had attempted to corrupt Justice McBride through the use of liquor.

The disbarment proceedings have attracted wide attention throughout the state and reports received here indicated that a large crowd of spectators would be on hand when the Mannix-Joseph case is called for hearing Monday.

The supreme court originally appointed W. Lair Thompson of Portland as a prosecutor in both proceedings. Joseph protested against Thompson acting as a prosecutor in the case against Mannix, on the grounds that Thompson was his bitter political enemy and would use his efforts to prevent the introduction of testimony embarrassing to members of the supreme court. The supreme court then appointed two sets of prosecutors.

Eye Hazards

Thousands of people lose their sight annually through accidents. Statistics prove that nearly all could easily have been avoided. Accidents, in fact, now constitute by far the most frequent cause of total and partial blindness.

We could fill volumes with the variety of accidents which we have and will be confronted with at home and in business, and methods of preventing such accidents we can only hint at and offer a few suggestions.
