Publication of Rand Charges Not Inspired by Defendant, Said

summoned as a witness in this case.

C. H. Brockhagen, editor and publisher of the Portland Telegram was the initial witness. He testified that he did not consult with Mr. Joseph on the articles on the Rand connection with the Wemme matters but that he knew Hansen was in daily contact with Mr. Joseph. He said he was in California most of the time the articles appeared, but that there was no collaboration between the Telegram and Mr. Joseph in the preparation of the articles. He identified over twenty exhibits as copies of the Portland Telegram, in which were the stories and editorials containing the material Mannix charges as false and as sponsored by Joseph.

Henry Hansen, political writer on the Telegram, denied that the material for any of the articles dealing with the assault on Rand were supplied by Joseph. Former Senator Stanfield gave him the tip and referred him to persons who might supply information. All of these he consulted with the exception of George Joseph. They included Frank Hanley, E. C. Sammons who were connected with the Wemme estate matters; and he secured documentary evidence from the alien property custodian's office at Washington through the offices of Senators McNary, Steiwer and Rep. Korell.

Hansen, while denying receiving information or assistance from Joseph on the Telegram articles, asserted he assisted Joseph in the preparation of his radio addresses attacking Rand during his campaign for re-election. On cross-examination he testified that Judge Littlefield, now deceased, and Mr. Joseph advised Mr. Brockhagen before the first article was published that its publication might put them in contempt of court.

Falling through the examination of Brockhagen and Hansen to connect Joseph with the Telegram's campaign, the prosecution obtained admission as evidence over the objection of the defense transcripts of transcripts of testimony of E. L. Cope, former city editor of the Telegram, which he gave in the libel suit of Mannix against the Telegram. This testimony was to the effect that he called up Joseph daily and gave the general purport of the news.

Will Redhead, business manager of the Telegram testified as to the paper's circulation.

Irving Rand, son of the justice, identified copies of the Joseph circulars which he had received through the mail.

Stephen A. Stone, Salem A. P. correspondent testified that the long text of complaints filed in the supreme court had not been wired by him to Portland. Hansen had previously admitted that such complaints had been received by him at the Joseph law offices.

Court decisions in the cases of Wadsworth vs. Brigham, Traver vs. Naylor, Brensen vs. Derby, Harvey vs. Campbell, Huddleson vs. Sanders-Swift company, and certified copies of charges against Mannix by Joseph and of the complaint in the case of Condit vs. Neppach and Mannix were presented by the prosecution.

Justices Rand and McBride testified in denial of receiving copies of the Joseph circulars prior to their publication. At four o'clock the prosecution stated its one remaining witness who was coming from Tacoma had not arrived and the hearing was adjourned till 9:30 Tuesday morning.

Interested auditors at yesterday's hearing were Attorneys Arthur L. Clark of Corvallis, Evan Reames of Medford, and Arthur McKahan of Albany who are the official prosecutors of the disbarment charges against Thomas Mannix. This is the reverse side of the Joseph case and the hearing will follow the conclusion of the Joseph case.

INFORMATION NOW HAS ADDED DATA

12TH STREET ROAD LIKELY

Resurvey Authorized When Engineers Meet With County Court

The prospect of a paved road leading out South Twelfth street to the Pacific highway loomed bright at a meeting of road engineers with the county court here Monday when it was decided to resurvey the road extension. State Market Road Engineer Scott pointed out the fact that the road would be one of the most important roads ever planned by Marion county. He declared that a paved road was inevitable and predicted that improvement sometime within the next four or five years.

Relief of heavy congestion on the Pacific highway as it is located at present is one of the features of the new road. Heavy traffic over South Commercial street has nearly wrecked the pavement to such an extent that portions of the street resemble a wash board.

The continuation of South Twelfth street was planned a year ago and it was thought that construction would be completed in 1929 but troubles regarding right of way caused the program to be discontinued. The new location as planned by the state market road engineer will give the road a clear right of way without any objection on the part of property owners in the district.

Inasmuch as the improvement of the road to a state market road as well as making it a through highway, the residents of the district are doubly interested because it will cut off a big district expense.

ROBERT TASKER OF SALEM IS PAROLED

Robert Tasker, convict-author who was a resident of Salem up to 11 years ago, was paroled from San Quentin penitentiary in California Monday, according to word received here.

He has been given a sentence of from five years to life in 1924, for holding up a dance hall with an unloaded gun. Since that time, he has attracted nation-wide attention through his literary work, which includes a novel "Grimhaven," and a number of magazine articles.

The parole was not unexpected. Several weeks ago while in California, Sheldon F. Sackett of this city visited Tasker at the penitentiary, and the young man told him at that time that he was expecting an early release.

Robert Tasker is remembered by Miss Mabel Robertson, now dean of girls at the Salem high school, as a pupil at the Washington grade school when she was an instructor there. He was an unusually bright pupil, she recalls. Since being in the California prison, Tasker has corresponded regularly with Asahel Bush, Salem banker, who in company with prominent persons in various parts of the United States, worked for Tasker's pardon or parole.

ALLEN FUNERAL IS SCHEDULED TODAY

Funeral service for Mrs. Florence A. Allen, who died in Portland hospital Sunday, will be held this morning at 10:30 o'clock from the Rigelon mortuary chapel, with Rev. Norman Kendall Tully officiating. Mrs. Allen, wife of William G. Allen of the Hunt Brothers cannery, had been ill for more than two months.

Florence Cook was born in Shelton, Iowa, 53 years ago, and came with her parents to Oregon at the age of nine years. The family located at Newberg, where she lived until 1900 when she was married to William G. Allen. After six months spent in Salem, Mr. and Mrs. Allen moved to Eugene, where they remained until 1911 when they again came to Salem to make their home and where they lived continuously since.

Mrs. Allen leaves three sons: Wayne, Kenneth and Harold, all of Salem; and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. E. C. Belders and Miss Carrie Degermark are in charge of the entertainment. The Christmas tree will be decorated by Miss Rita White and Miss Catherine Barbyte. Mrs. Herman Pfister and Mrs. Wolgamott are planning the refreshments. Hour for the teachers' party is 7:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Allen was prominent in local social circles and club activities, was a member of the Salem Woman's club and also of the First Presbyterian church.

fiction of the senate's reservation which is embodied in the revised protocol is not acceptable. It was held today at the senate that a two-thirds majority would be required for approval of the revised protocol, as was the case when adherence was first voted.

Democratic leaders who have supported the world court participation from the outset voiced approval today of the modification of the senate reservation which was worked out last spring by Elihu Root with a committee of international jurists.
