Battle Rock Fund Aided and Annual Meeting Plans Announced by Leader

DALLAS, December 12.—The Dallas Chamber of Commerce voted \$5.00 at its meeting Wednesday noon, to be contributed to the State Highway Commission Battle Rock Fund.


This fund is for the purpose of purchasing land adjacent to Battle Rock at Port Orford in Curry county and which was the scene of one of the early day Indian battles. It is proposed to erect a statue of the former president, Theodore Roosevelt on the rock, the holdings to be turned into a state park under direction of the state highway commission. The directors decided to hold the annual meeting of the chamber of commerce on the evening of January 8, in the form of a dinner, at which time the annual reports will be given, and the vote for new directors will be canvassed. These votes are by mail, each member voting for the 11 men he thinks should be on the board of directors, and the 11 receiving the highest vote are elected, and from that number the officers are elected. The committee to have charge of the meeting will be announced later by the president, Maurice Dalton.

A meeting of the two committees from the Kiwanis club and chamber of commerce will be held next week to consider locations for joint quarters for the two organizations. Members of the committee from the Kiwanis club are Dr. A. B. Starbuck, R. R. Turner and W. L. Seelien, from the chamber of commerce are N. L. Guy, Earle Rielandson, and R. S. Krasen.
