#### Ten to Compete in Finals For Atwater Kent Awards

Tens of thousands of young singers throughout the country are expected to listen eagerly to the program of the Atwater Kent radio hour Sunday evening December 15, when it will present! the ten finalists of the third national radio audition, in which the young listeners themselves participated. It will be broadcast 11 to 12 midnight—Fox Hollywood over KGW, KGO, KOMO at 6:15 p. m. At the conclusion of the program, or very shortly thereafter, a board of seven famous musicians and musical authorities will announce their verdict as to the order in which the ten voices rank. Their judgment will determine the distribution of cash awards totaling \$25,000, and ten musical scholarships, offered by the Atwater Kent foundation of Philadelphia, sponsors of this nation-wide search for undiscovered musical talent.
