Grandmother and Granddaughter Are Now Students At Oregon Normal School

MONMOUTH, Dec. 14.—A grandmother and her granddaughter, both residents of Monmouth, and with a half century span between their respective ages, are students of the Oregon Normal school this term. They are Mrs. Eugenia Snyder, 67, and Miss Agnes Sheoon, 17. Mrs. Snyder was born near Statesville, N. C., in 1862, and when 7 years old emigrated with her parents to Arkansas by wag-

on train. As a memento of that journey she has in her possession a chest of drawers, handmade, in 1840 of solid black walnut, which they carried with them to the new frontier. The chest is an early colonial style, and was a gift from Mrs. Snyder's grandmother to the former's father. Facilities for her early education were limited, so Mr. Snyder studied at home. While teaching

in the government school in Indian Territory she attended summer session of Tahlequah, Oklahoma, Northeastern state normal, completing the work of the preparatory department in 1910. Since coming to Monmouth in 1920 she has served as night operator of the Willamette Telephone company; and in 1922 was graduated from the Oregon Normal school. She then taught a three month's term of school at Lexington, Moro county, but soon returned to the night operator job where she continues to efficiently serve the people of Monmouth. She is teacher of the high school girls' class in the Sunday school of the Evangelical church, and this fall re-entered the Normal registering for a course in religious education.

Her grand daughter, Miss Agnes Sheoon, was born at Collbran, Colo., in 1912, and has attended the Monmouth schools since her fifth grade year. Last June she was graduated from the Monmouth high school, and is now taking the regular standard course at the Normal, majoring in English.

In incidentally, the Monmouth telephone exchange is entirely operated by members of Mrs. Snyder's family. A daughter, Mrs. Guy Sheoon, the mother of Agnes, is chief operator. Mrs. O. H. Snyder, another daughter is day operator; and Agnes works in the office on special shifts. A third daughter, Miss Francis Snyder, was formerly chief operator here for several years, but now is teaching in the commercial department of the Cushman, Oregon, high school.
