**SILVERTON BEACON NOW IN OPERATION**

SILVERTON, Dec. 21.—The great airplane beacon erected at the instance of the division of aeronautics of the United States department of commerce, is now in position at the Legion airport at Silverton.

The beacon measures 24 inches in diameter and is at the pinnacle of a tower 51 feet high. It

is of the revolving type and the lights are 2,000,000 candle power. At the foot of the tower is a control box from which emergency lights may be turned on. The lights are so arranged that the windsock will show the direction of the wind at night.

The electric current for the beacon will be supplied by the city of Silverton. The lights will be turned on as soon as arrangements can be completed.
