This building was also the meeting place of the first Masonic assemblage held in Portland, and-so far as known- in Oregon. The Butler dwelling-a cabin-stood where the present post office of Portland is located.

Mr. Butler also laid the first brick chimney for steam that was laid in Oregon. Merchandising was his business, and on leaving Portland he operated a general store at Eola for some years, settling at Monmouth in 1870, where he built the spackous home which continues as the scene of the Butler homecom-Home Hour.
