DALLAS, Jan. 10.—New directors for the chamber of commerce elected at the annual meeting, January 8, to serve for 1930 are: Earle Richardson, J. R. Allgood, H. G. Black, Oscar Hayter, Dr. W. L. Pemberton, C. L. Crider, R. S. Kreason, W. L. Soehren, and Maurice Dawson, automatically elected. J. R. Beck and W. S. Muir are new members. The new board will meet Saturday noon at which time they will elect a president, vice president and secretary. Eugene Hayter of the Dallas National bank automatically serves as treasurer according to the by laws of the club.

A moving picture of the members assembled for the dinner was taken by William Carde who is here taking a number of industrial scenes in Dallas. The picture will be shown at the local theater Friday and Saturday night.

Rev. O. D. Peterson acted as chairman for the evening, greeting was extended by J. R. Allgood, vice president, following which came the report of the years work, and a financial report by the secretary, Mrs. Charles N. Blyeu.

The report of the elections committee by W. C. Retzer, and a report by Dr. V. C. Staats of suggested activities for 1930, among them being a road program, new industries, improvement of city park, city beautification, more advertising of Polk county, new trade territory. 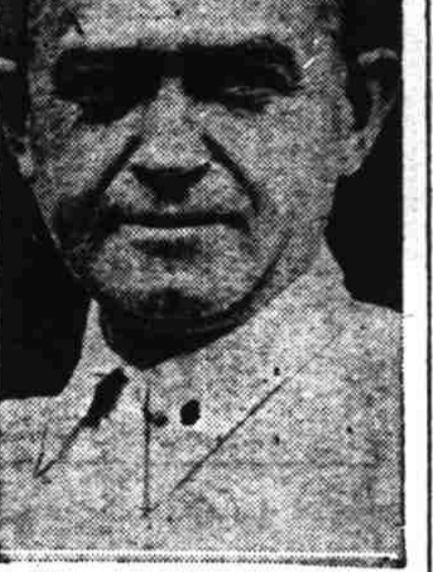
SILVERTON CHURCH ELECTION IS HELD
