The proportion dropped until a recent check resulted in the count being less

than two to one for Liberty street. This was on the incoming traffic. For outgoing traffic the count now is practically even showing that High street is coming into common use for cars leaving the business center. The counts were made for fifteen minutes intervals from 10 to 11 a.m. and from 2 to 3 p.m., at times when there

was no special stimulus to traffic. As the use of the street grows, demand may come for making the intersection a stop street; and at that time traffic checks would need to be made to determine the flow of traffic.
