

TWO MURDERS ARE CONNECTED

New Clues Found When Bullets From Machine Guns Are Examined

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The "St. Valentine's day massacre" in Chicago last year and the murder of Frankie Yale, who was "put on the spot" in Brooklyn in July, 1928, were linked today in a police report which indicated the bullets fired in both killings were from the same sub-machine gun.

Commissioner Grover A. Whalen made the announcement that he had received "startling information" from Chicago, where he had sent two of the New York police department's firearms experts with slugs taken from Frankie Yale's body.

The experts were to compare these slugs with those which killed the seven members of "Bugs" Moran's gang while they were lined up in the rear of a Chicago garage on February 14, 1929.

Commissioner Whalen said his information came from Dr. Herman Bundesen, Chicago coroner, and when his ballistic experts return he expects them to have corroboration of the information which has just come to me by telephone.

"If they have," he added, "I shall probably make public some interesting and surprising news about a murder in Brooklyn."

The gun which the new clues indicate shot down the Brooklyn gang leader and was used in the Chicago massacre was seized in a raid in St. Joseph, Mich., a few weeks ago when a small arsenal belonging to Frankie Burke, Chicago gunman, was taken.

Burke has been sought unsuccessfully since the slaughter of St. Valentine's day by Chicago police who charged the gunman, dressed in a policeman's uniform, was implicated in the wholesale elimination of the seven members of the Moran gang.

New York police previously have declared that several racketeers have been the work of Chicago gunmen. The automobile from which Frankie Yale met his doom as he drove down a Brooklyn street, it was once brought out, bore an Illinois license.

While asserting that the present diversion is one fifth that of three years ago and is continuing to be reduced, Dr. Doran warned the dry crusaders that too much stress should not be placed on this phase of enforcement.

Tentative arrangements have been made for him to meet Premier Andre Tardieu, Duce of France and Foreign Minister Dino Grandi of Italy, on Sunday, but unless the Japanese take the initiative, Secretary Stimson will not meet them again before the conference, considering that the conversations in Washington were complete and satisfactory until the delegates were actually assembled around the conference table.

After a brief welcoming ceremony on the quay, where the mayor of Plymouth in scarlet robes and attended by mace-bearers, greeted them, the Americans boarded one of the finest trains of salmon cars England could assemble, and sped up to London through the green English countryside. Over Dartmoor and into the heart of Devon, the coaches rolled past a never-ending succession of hedges, green lanes and villages of thatched-roof cottages. Where the tracks ran close to the seashore, the waves not only broke into the picture but over the train itself, splashing the windows of the cars, the channel still being turbulent after the storm that delayed the George Washington.

Beyond the historic city of Exeter, many friends and some villages were deep in water from flooded streams and pouring rains.

At noon tomorrow he will lead the American delegation to pay his formal respects to Mr. MacDonald at Downing street. Then he hopes to rest at his country place in Middlesex county, near London.

Very Tired

In a very busy week and facing him, Secretary Stimson tonight gave the impression of a tired man after the stormy finish of his transatlantic voyage and the rush and excitement of landing in England and beginning work for the conference.

BOOTLEG SOURCES TRACED IN SPEECH

DETROIT, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Division of industrial alcohol furnishes but a small portion of the intoxicating beverages sold by American bootleggers, Dr. James M. Doran, prohibition commissioner, said today in an address before the anti-saloon league national convention.

While asserting that the present diversion is one fifth that of three years ago and is continuing to be reduced, Dr. Doran warned the dry crusaders that too much stress should not be placed on this phase of enforcement.

COREY EXPLAINS RULING OF I. C. C.

H. H. Corey, member of the Oregon public service commission, said Friday that he was not surprised at refusal of the interstate commerce commission to order construction of the Lewiston-Homedale railroad by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company. The cost of the proposed railroad was estimated at \$29,000,000. It was to be 81 miles in length.

Corey said the line would not create new traffic, but would have diverted traffic from the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company's lines.

The greater part of the line would have been along the Snake river in Oregon. The Oregon public service commission joined with the Idaho and Washington commissions in requesting construction of the road.

Harvard System of Coaching Is Talked

A high authority at the school who declines to permit his name to be used revealed that officials are considering changes similar to the policy adopted by Harvard four years ago and virtually revolutionizing the present system.

The senate committee on athletics also revealed five proposals for changes made by Dr. Spears Wednesday night before his departure for the west to discuss details of a contract at Oregon university with President Arnold Bennett Hall of that school.

The proposed changes in the athletic system would institute a compulsory sports system for all able bodied students, limit intercollegiate competition and provide for engagement of Minnesota alumni only in all branches of coaching.

Under the tentative plan, as announced by the unnamed authority, intercollegiate competition in athletic contests would be limited to Michigan and Wisconsin and to universities in the east and the far west. It also called for relief from dependence on the Big Ten for games of any sort.

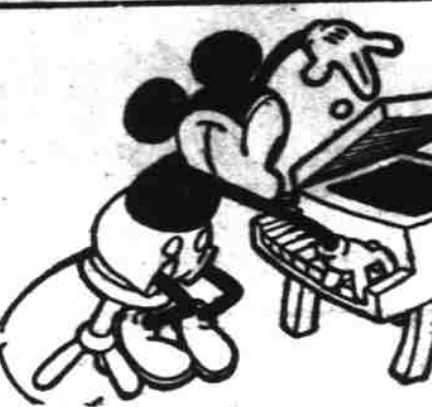
