Meanwhile, the candidates in the field did some slight maneuvering but along the general front the cold weather kept all the heavy artillery silent. Governor Norblad was most active of the office seekers as he went to Woodburn and then to Portland later on to Astoria to make addresses. "Full for Oregon or pull out" was the catch phrase of his several speeches and at Woodburn, notably, the girl's chorus caught up the topic and carried a placard with "Al's" statement upon it while members of the organization wore Norblad ribbons.

Henry L. Corbett sat tight in Portland, said little but was named president of the Pacific International Livestock Export for the coming year and thus another activity was added to the formidable group with which his name already appears. Editor Merle Chesnut of the Astorian Budget launched a full-column editorial tirade on Corbett, declaring him essentially provincial Portlander without a fair appreciation of the state's needs and headed the editorial with the title "High Hat Harry." Editor Chapman related that his women would be an asset to the candidate rather than a liability.

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with traffic in and around Woodburn since Wednesday.

For almost a week the youth of this vicinity enjoyed ice skating on the nearby ponds and small lakes, but since the heavy snowfall, youth and age alike have remained by the cheery firesides.

Education, due to interrupted bus service, has been handicapped seriously. Wednesday the four large buses that convey students to Woodburn high, were unable to go out because they were unequipped with chains and Thursday they went out but the Butterville-Donald bus was unable to get back and the students were returned to Woodburn where they stayed over night. Friday, the Aurora bus went down the highway to Aurora and returned the same way, not traveling its usual route because of deep drifts. The Butterville-Donald bus was still unable to get out of town and the students may have to remain in town several days.

Few of the usual hilarious sleigh parties have been organized due to the depth of the snow and the inability of cars to pull the sleds. Only one party has ventured out and after plowing the streets of the city for about an hour, they abandoned the idea as too wet and cold.

GERVAIS, Jan. 18.—(Special) Even snow shovels were inadequate in assisting the rural mail carriers on the three routes out of Gervais in getting through the drifts Friday morning. Ted Nibler found his greatest difficulty in the Fairfield district. M. J. Mahoney became stalled in a drift south of town and had to retrace his route. Otto Sevald encountered drifts seven or eight feet deep southeast of town near the Pioneer church, where the snow had drifted onto the highway from the fields. They were more than twice the usual time making their deliveries. Road supervisors were out Friday afternoon clearing the roads.

JEFFERSON, Jan. 18.—(Special) The cold spell is still on at Jefferson, no snow having fallen since Wednesday night, when an inch more fell, making a total of about six inches on the ground.

The wind, sweeping from the north, brought the thermometer down to 23 degrees above, Friday morning, which caused more water pipes to freeze.

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SO THIS IS SALEM

SALEM'S most distinctive feature as a city is its wide, smooth streets. Unlike most cities of its size it is not pockmarked with red and green traffic lights on its principal streets, nor polluted with one-way traffic streets. Many people here are of the opinion that the wide streets include the necessity of automatic traffic controls for motorists and pedestrians. (Or should I say Salemers?) ought to be thankful to those wise men who planned wide streets or to the fact that land was cheap, when the city was platted.

However, I am willing to wager that the wide streets, a boon to traffic movement today, will sometime be cut down in width—not by adding to the sidewalk width, but by the establishments of safety islands in the center of the street at each of the principal crossings. Such safety spots would provide a mid-way rest spot in the perilous trip across the wide ways, as well as a landing station for bus passengers. With daily recruits being discharged by General Moe Tors we will need rest islands, within the next few years. Traffic jams are getting stickier every day.

Hayden Tosses Hat in Ring For Position as J. P.

M. B. Hayden, Salem attorney, announced his candidacy for the position of justice of the peace here in May with a statement of principle Saturday.

He declared that his platform would be "to give impartial administration of the law, with equality of justice dispensed with an even hand, to the end that a strict enforcement of the law may be had in both civil and criminal cases."

Hayden, having formally filed, has announced that this slogan will be placed on the ballot opposite his name: "Justice given with an even hand, impartial and strict law enforcement."

Hayden came to Salem several years ago after an extended residence in Bandon, Coos county, Oregon. There he served for some time as justice of the peace, his record in that territory was said to be an even hand, impartial and strict law enforcement.

DISARMAMENT MEET LOOMS

Hope Runs High for Ultimate Success and Consequent Navy Reduction

shores during the week, prime minister MacDonald re-stated its purpose as "the maximum deductions consistent with national security."

This basic proposal of Britain's labor prime minister and President Hoover's expression of high hopes for results at London are the two rocks upon which the structure of an international treaty eliminating naval building competition will be built. But around the base of these rocks swirl treacherous currents of difficult and complex international problems.

Sea power today presents dangers as real as they have been throughout the centuries, and one of the greatest fears of the delegates assembled in London is that there is no need to depress world opinion not to arouse its expectations to too high a level about the prospects.

The British government feels that even a satisfactory agreement will seem disappointing if too much is expected. All the delegates insist that the step by step advance toward the ideal of general disarmament must always be kept in mind. The London conference is but one effort towards this ultimate goal.

Undaunted by difficulties, Secretary Stimson, prime minister MacDonald, foreign minister Gradi of Italy, Reijiro Wakatsuki of Japan, and Foreign Minister Briand of France, and spending final hurried days exchanging viewpoints and opinions, and seeking in informal preliminary understanding that will smooth the troubled waters of world naval problems.

Secretary of State Stimson spent another busy day and faces an equally busy one tomorrow.

The rest of the schedule has so far remained the same as originally planned, a return game with McMinnville high January 22 being the next event. January 10 the Bulldogs embarrassed the McMinnville quint by defeating them 20 to 12 in Woodburn's gym and it is expected that the Mac high boys will put up a scrap to even the series. January 29, Woodburn has another crack at Salem high and does not intend that Salem should have the big end of as one-sided a score as it had at the last game between these two schools.

LA JOLLA, Calif., Jan. 18.—(AP)—Two professionals, Dick Linares, Tucson, Ariz., Phil Hart, Wheeling, W. Va., and George Von Elm, Detroit, one of the nation's leading amateurs, today tied for top honors in the La Jolla \$1000 tournament.

The trio turned in cards of 70, one under par, to finish ahead of some 90 performers, who halted here to try their turn on the picturesque course before continuing their journey across the border to Agua Caliente where the \$25,000 open classic starts Monday. Linares and Hart split \$500 first and second place money.

A number of the contestants including Walter Hagen, British open champion, MacDonald Smith, Long Island, N. Y., Johnny Farrell, former open title holder and others preferred to make it a day of rest in anticipation of the final drive for the victor's \$10,000 share of the big stake and withdrew from today's play.

Following the leaders by a stroke came a quartet of others who shot perfect scores over the course which was still slow as the result of recent heavy rains. They were Al Espinosa, Chicago; Charles Guest, Los Angeles; Olin Dutra, Santa Monica; and Bill Foley, Coronado, Calif.

Behind them came Denny Shute, Columbus, Ohio, winner of the recent Los Angeles \$10,000 open; with a score of 72, Leo Diegel, Agua Caliente, Mexico, P. G. A. champion, with a 75 and Horton Smith, Joplin, Mo., with a 73.

Lomski, who won seven of the ten rounds, got only a draw because the judges and the referee disagreed.

Jack Elder Is Easy Winner in College Games

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Jack Elder, Notre Dame sprint star, turned in two victories tonight in his only eastern appearance in the winter track season, winning the 60 and 75 yard dashes at the Brooklyn college games.

Winning the 60 yard race easily, Elder met some stiff competition from Karl Widmer, Georgetown's intercollegiate champion, in the 75 yard race and was awarded first place by a three to two decision of the judges. The time for the 75 was 7 4-5 seconds.

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AERIAL DRIVE FOR EIELSON IS PUSHED

NOME, Alaska, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The big aerial drive for northern Siberia to search for Carl Ben Eielson and Earl Borland, missing American aviators, is under way today.

Eleven airplanes, manned by American, Russian and Canadian aviators were either on their way today toward North Cape, Siberia, or poised at various places in Alaska or Siberia, awaiting favorable weather for a massed attack on the mystery which has surrounded the fate of Eielson and Borland since they disappeared on the 500 mile flight from Teller, Alaska, to North Cape, Nov. 9.

Two Fairchild cabin planes of the Aviation Corporation were to fly from Nome to Teller today to fuel for the final dash for North Cape, where two American aviators, Joe Crosson and Harold Gilliam, are awaiting their arrival.

Crosson has made some exploratory flights from North Cape in his small open cockpit plane, but has been handicapped by shortage of fuel and poor visibility. Gilliam's plane was damaged in landing on the ice beside the trading vessel Nanuk and he has been making repairs so he can join the search.

The Fairchild planes are to be piloted by Captain Pat Reid, Canadian aviator and Ed Young, an Alaskan.

LINFIELD COLLEGE PLAYS WILLAMETTE

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Jan. 18.—(Special)—Linfield college will open the northwest conference basketball schedule here Friday, January 24, when the Willamette team comes to McMinnville for the first of a two-game series. A return game will be played at Salem Saturday night.

Linfield backers are expecting a hard game against the strong Willamette five. The defeat of the University of Oregon team at the hands of Beacraft has done a great deal to impress the local players that they will be meeting one of the strongest teams in the conference when they play Willamette.

The game scheduled for Friday night against Pacific university had to be canceled because of the storm. Linfield officials have announced that the game will be played at Forest Grove Tuesday night, weather permitting.

Speech of King George Will Be Broadcast Here

King George is to speak in the royal gallery of the House of Lords at 11:00 o'clock in the morning, British time. This will mean that his address will be heard about 8:00 o'clock in the morning on the Pacific coast.

The king has given his permission to have his address broadcast by the British Broadcasting corporation, which will send his words on short waves to the United States where the speech will be rebroadcast if successfully picked up.
