

Care of Sheep in Snow Is Proving Difficult Problem

SNOW HARD FOR SHEEP FLOCKS

Lambing Season On in Zena District and Care Proves Difficult

ZENA, Jan. 18.—Sheep men of this vicinity did not welcome the big snow storm Tuesday night, nor the gale which swept through the valley Thursday night.

Most men who lost a big percentage of lambs in 1929, due to paralysis of the ewes, caused by lack of exercise during the snows, learned a valuable lesson and will probably profit by their experience of last year. After the source of the trouble was diagnosed by veterinarians and field men representing Oregon State college, progressive sheep men exercised their flocks daily until lambing was over.

Lambing season has not started in this and neighboring vicinities and men with scattered flocks, in some instances flocks being pastured five or six miles apart, are having difficulties as the hard beaten tracks in the roadways are filled with snow blown by the winds Thursday night. The sheep which are not under shelter are usually fed in racks built for that purpose.
