CHURCH DAY TO BE OBSERVED

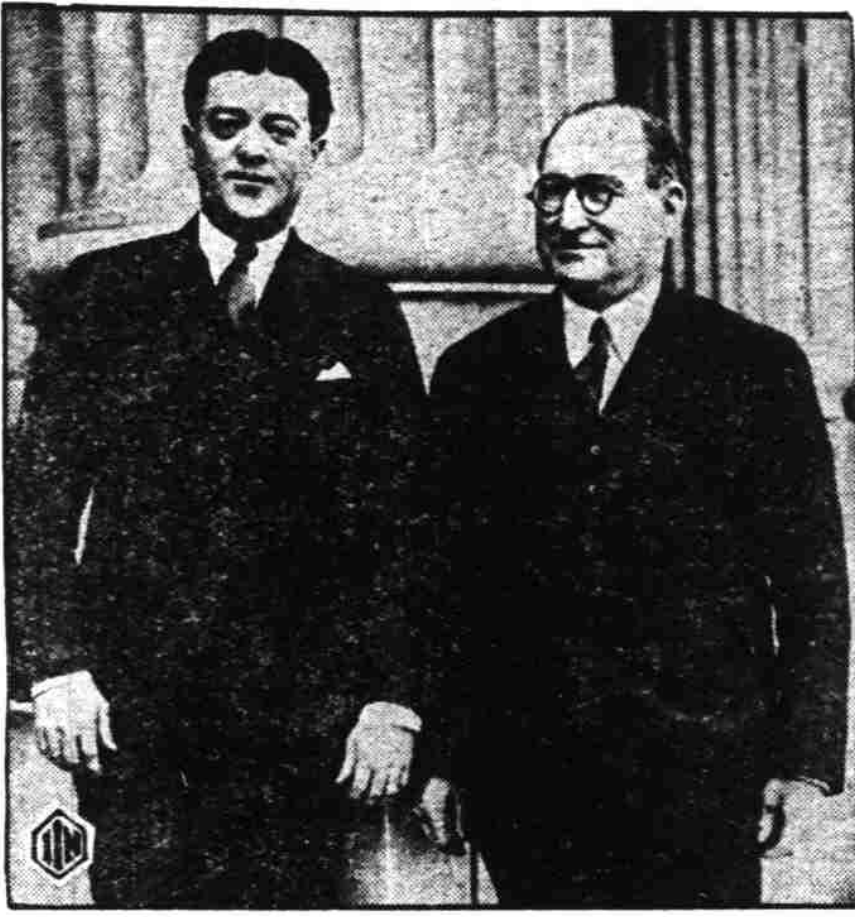
Presbyterian Church at Woodburn Will Observe Birthday

SPRING VALLEY, Jan. 21.—Only a foot of snow fell here last week and is drifting until at some lanes where fences are on both sides, it has reached several feet in depth, causing some delay in traffic although all the main roads are cleared. More snow and sleet fell Saturday night and hopes were high that the storm would be over as the farmers are having a battle feeding cattle and sheep every day.

Small lambs and young stock are particularly hard hit here. Birds, especially the quail are having a serious time finding sustenance. Most farmers are feeding them but some starve and freeze because they do not find the grain.

Before the snow fell, ice skating on Windsor slough was a favored pastime. Every day and night around 25 or 30 could be found enjoying the long stretch of ice and those who were not so adept at the sport kept bonfires brightly burning. Since snow fell a number of sleighing and coasting parties are being formed.
