

CLASH OCCURS OVER DRY LAW

Wet Congressman Stirs Up Row at Hearing of Committee

he contemplates leaving the government service. Assistant Secretary Lowman has not received his resignation.

Schafer's Conduct Makes Admonishment an Opportunity to Interrogate Doran, and objected at times to the way he answered. Chairman Williamson of the committee obliterated further exchanges by terminating the hearing.

At the outset the Wisconsin representative inquired why he had not been furnished requested information on industrial alcohol withdrawals, and charged the bureau had failed to eust agents who violated the search and seizure law. Doran rejoined that Schafer had not charged any violation of law in the withdrawal of alcohol and was not entitled to the information. He declared the department had always disciplined agents who violated its regulations and the laws.

Shouting at Schafer, who in turn roared at him, the commissioner said he did not intend "to stand for" charges made against agents for violation of law, but at the home when the acts were committed by sheriffs, constables and deputy constables.

Action on Specific Motion Postponed

A motion by Schafer to compel the commissioner to give information on alcohol withdrawals resulted in confusion. After exchanges between various members of the committee and Doran, the group decided by a vote of 12 to 8 to postpone action until an executive meeting. Chairman Williamson thereupon adjourned the meeting and called for another to be held behind closed doors tomorrow.

The gray haired treasury secretary sat slumped in a chair, his face expressionless, as he read in a low voice the declaration that placing of the prohibition enforcement bureau in the treasury department had been in illogical choice of congress.

Assistant Secretary Lowman, who has charge of prohibition, and Commissioner Doran stood close at each side of Mellon as he read and then turned to his questioners.

Williamson Bill Given Endorsement

Mellon endorsed the Williamson bill to provide for the transfer, and also for the creation of a new bureau to handle industrial alcohol and medicinal liquors permits in the treasury department.

Representative Igoe, republican, Illinois, asked whether he believed the prohibition bureau under the treasury had done everything possible to enforce the law. Mellon replied that he did not believe the question about the efficiency of the agency was pertinent to the question of transfer. "Do you believe that the prohibition bureau has done everything possible to enforce the law?" Igoe insisted.

"I am sure we have made every effort to carry out our responsibilities," the secretary answered. "Then you think prohibition can be enforced?" Igoe asked.

"As I say, this is a matter of legislation before us," straightening up in his chair. "Prohibition is a very controversial subject and I don't see that this is any place to express personal opinions."

a meagre supply of food and fuel. A dispatch from Holcomb, Mo., reported sub-zero temperatures in Dunklin county — where the St. Francis river smashed its levees last Saturday. Highways were impassable, business was paralyzed and homes housing refugees were running short of fuel. Ice which coated the floodwaters made the operation of boats hazardous and almost impossible and the depth of the water precluded attempts to wade through in some sections. Some sickness was reported, due to exposure.

The first death in the flood was reported today. Albie Slaughter, 29, Dunklin farmer, fell through the ice in Tallahatche county.

Harry D. Wilson, Louisiana commissioner of agriculture, estimated that the sugar cane planters of Louisiana had lost 25 to 30 per cent of their prospective crop in the series of freezes.

Tonight New Orleans prepared for a drop to 20 degrees in temperature while Biloxi, mobile and Pensacola anticipated the hardest freeze of the winter on the coast.

CONFABS HELD BY DELEGATES

Private Conversations Mark Day at London Disarmament Meeting

LONDON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The American, British, French, Italian and Japanese delegates to the five power naval conference played hide and seek all over London today in final exchanges of views before the first business meeting at St. James' palace tomorrow morning, when the chief delegates are to outline the general naval needs of their countries.

From early morning until late tonight the big limousines, flying national flags, slipped through the maze of London traffic from embassy to embassy, and back and forth from Downing street.

With quiet talks in the seclusion of their own headquarters and at the residence of the British prime minister, the delegates endeavored to remove preliminary difficulties and reach an understanding before buckling down to actual work.

Stimson and MacDonald Have Full Schedule

The respective schedules of Prime Minister MacDonald and a Secretary of State Stimson indicate what a busy day the delegates spent.

Mr. Stimson convened a general meeting of the American delegation at 10 a. m., which lasted for two hours, and then called on Mr. MacDonald at number 10 Downing street. Before going to lunch he also saw Ex-Premier Wakatsuki of Japan. After luncheon with Mrs. Stimson, he worked all afternoon in the offices of the American delegation, rounding up his statement for tomorrow's session.

Meanwhile, he had sent Ambassador Dawes with Senator Reed and Senator Robinson to see the Japanese, and later Ambassador Hugh Gibson to see Premier Tardieu of France and Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy.

Tonight Mr. Stimson went to his country home for quiet and for leisure to put the finishing touches to his outline of American naval needs.

MacDonald Conferences With France's Delegates

Prime Minister MacDonald was equally busy. After a cabinet meeting at 10:30 a. m., he met the French delegates in Downing street at 11, went over to parliament after evening Secretary Stimson and answered questions at the house of commons, and returned to Downing street in time to receive Mr. Wakatsuki before tea time. Between his calls for conferences and to the house of commons he found time to broadcast a message on the conference to the United States.

During his spare moments Mr. MacDonald talked with the delegates of the British dominions, and thus did not have 20 minutes to himself all day.

Historic, old St. James palace is ready to receive the most cosmopolitan gathering in its history.

The main conference will open in Queen Anne's old drawing room, an exquisite room decorated in rose and gold.

The long dining room adjacent, where huge fireplaces give an air of homely English hospitality, has become the general meeting place for delegates.

Throne Room, Used By French Clerical Staff

The French clerical staff meets in the throne room, which has a fireplace brought by the Duke of Wellington from his foreign campaigns.

For the first time in the history of the old palace it is hearing the whirl of electric transmitters carrying thousands and thousands of words of press cable to stations for relay to every corner in the world. The machines are installed in the old guardrooms, where Charles I is said to have spent the night before his execution, under walls covered with swords, pikes and pieces of armor.

Throughout the day's proceedings the delegates sought harmony of expressions for tomorrow's first business session.

As yet only the broadest phases of the problems confronting the conference have been touched upon. The conciliatory note remains dominant.

Erroneous Report Given Circulation

Nevertheless the British, the Americans and the French, the delegates to the conference, have been seriously erroneous report sent abroad about the nature of the proceedings. This report was to the effect that Premier Tardieu of France was acting as a mediator between Great Britain and the United States who were described as being "far apart."

British officials eludes quickly discredited the report, the American delegation expressed surprise that it had been circulated, and Premier Tardieu and the French delegation met it with an official denial.

Conference circles pointed out that the publication occasionally of misleading reports cannot be avoided during such international gatherings as the conference now being held in London, but added that they were harmful in their effect upon world opinion and understanding of negotiations.
