But the story is even harder than that, she indicated, with the Charities running low on supplies and contributions of the local people depended upon to replenish the treasury for the needy's succor. Clothing is coming in pretty well, but is being claimed almost at once. With scarcely anything but fruit and apples on hand, contributions of any kind are welcome.

Mrs. Young is feeding about a dozen persons a day at the Charities headquarters, cooking on nothing but an old heating stove. He says if someone has a discarded percolator that she could use, she'd be happy to get it to facilitate feeding her group. Knives, plates and cups and saucers are also needed, as well as canned soups and food.

INSPECTION OF MEATS URGED

School Physician Gives Talk
Before Health Class
At Salem High

"Practically all cases of meat poisoning are traceable to unsupervised meat supply," Edward Lee Russell, school physician, told sophomore students in his health education classes yesterday in discussing meat handling in preparation to health. Health education as such is a new course at the high school this year and is being worked in with the regular gymnasium schedule. Each student being required to take an hour class of health education each week.

Milk and meat in relation to health, have been considered this week and last by both Dr. Russell and Hollis Huntington, school coach, who is assisting Russell with the health education classes.

The United States is the greatest meat eating nation on the globe, Russell told his class, with the average yearly consumption at 166 pounds per capita. In England, 125 pounds per capita, has been figured as the yearly use in this country, the 166 pounds per person are divided as follows: Pork, 77.3; beef, 61.1; veal 7.6; mutton and lamb, 5.4; lard, 14.4 pounds.

Although the United States government spend more than \$5,000,000 annually in meat inspection service, at present a third of the meat slaughtered in this country is not under government inspection, the school physician pointed out. He explained also phases of the federal law.

Diseases traceable to meat supplies include tapeworm, which may be contracted by eating raw or partially cooked beef or pork; food and mouth ulcers, regular consumption of meat; and tuberculosis. In 1924 statistics show that animals were condemned for 40 different diseases and conditions.
