

ENVOYS FROM ITALY REPEAT

Delegation Refuses to Back Up Single Step in Its Official Stand

The present construction show Italy is keeping pace with the French in new warships. The figures are said to show that of light auxiliary submarine ships of the water or under construction, France has 231,000 tons, to Italy's 227,000 tons. Of submarines in service at present, France is shown to have 32,000 tons, Italy, 27,000 tons.

France far ahead. In new submarines, however, the memorandum will show that while France is building 50,000 tons of submarines, Italy at the present time has laid down only 9,000 tons.

The move made by Grandi today saved disarrangement negotiations from the doldrums during the French cabinet shakeup and provided the delegates with plenty of food for study during the absence of the chief French delegates.

George Leygues, French minister of marine, officially informed Mr. MacDonald of the French political situation, while Ambassador De Flourens notified the other delegates that the work of the French conference group was suspended.

This was somewhat of a surprise because it was expected that the French delegates would continue to participate in the technical work. They probably will sit as observers when the experts meet tomorrow to continue consideration of special tonnage tables.

Frenchman Remains To Watch Developments. The French delegation became apprehensive when it learned the nature of the conference between Grandi, Stimson and MacDonald. M. Leygues, the only French delegate here, planned to return to Paris today and then decided to remain in London as an observer. He changed his plans again this afternoon and left for Paris.

Grandi's move was the first prominent part he has played in the London negotiations for a week. A British spokesman said that the delegates and experts remaining in London would have plenty of technical work to occupy them for the week despite the absence of the French. He said that whatever changes occurred in the French government, there was little probability of the French conference policy being altered in London.

General sentiment is noted in London favoring the return of Andre Tardieu as premier of France, with Aristide Briand as foreign minister. The possibility of former President Poincare being asked to form a cabinet and coming to London instead of Tardieu did not bring favorable comment from British circles.

As to the question of Japanese-American settlements regarding naval matters, that will await the outcome of the Japanese national elections.

quent arrest and conviction and resignation.

The public statement says further: "With regard to his resignation, recent events will show that it was not serious and never intended. It will be recalled a statement was made to both Salem papers that he would advise his congregation to make the vote unanimous to accept his resignation. People who witnessed the farce last Sunday morning will testify that he did not once ask the people to accept his resignation but rather carried on a campaign for votes and made his appeal, not to people of mature judgment, but made his appeal to children from eight to 16 years of age, from which he received a large percentage of his support. Success as Church Organizer Cited.

"It is true that Mr. Payne was quite successful as a church organizer. The Sunday school plant was rebuilt under his supervision and quite a large sum of money was raised by the membership. However, the feeling among the people who are against him, is such that even the good he has done is far over shadowed by his recent conduct. . . .

"We deeply regret that his conduct has compelled us to make a public statement of the fact and that he has not only again split the church but has caused a lot of heartaches in many family circles.

"The statement of our board of trustees shows that the church debt is now approximately \$111,000, of which \$85,000 is a debt contracted for the pipe organ and installation, and about \$700 balance due on the Sunday school plant, which shows that the church has, in the past few months, already gone in arrears about \$1,500 for current expenses.

"In order that the public may know the existing feeling among its officers and church leaders, we want to say that he lost the support of all the deacons except one and has only the support of two of the trustees and lost practically all the teachers and officers of the Sunday school."

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INFORMATION ABOUT CANADA IS SCARCE

Lack of information about Canada is almost universal in the United States, whereas Canadians know much about the United States, it was declared Tuesday by the Rev. J. Calvin Reed of Columbia university, New York, who has been in Salem for several days, speaking at the Presbyterian church Sunday.

Mr. Reed referred to a telegraphic news item in The Statesman relative to important scientific discoveries made at McGill university, Toronto. McGill is in Montreal, he points out, and the discoveries were made at Toronto university, of which he is an alumnus. This, he said, is an example of the "misinformation" which comes from Canada through the lack of knowledge about that country on this side of the line.

News from the United States is carried extensively in Canadian newspapers, Mr. Reed said; but papers in this country seldom contain anything from Canada, and the details of its capital, Ottawa, is almost never seen, while stories from the capital of Mexico are prominently displayed almost every day.
