and, one of the Philippine group. Returning to the United States, Baker said he went to work for the Guggenheim laboratory in New York. He hoped he would be sent to South America by the company, but when he found he was not to have the opportunity he said he left. Shortly after midnight, December 28, 1928, Baker said he returned to the laboratory.

"I went to the laboratory after midnight on December 27, Baker said in his confession. "There was a new watchman there but he let me in. He was drinking some coffee and I put some poison in it when he wasn't looking. He drank it. I stayed there until he was dead.

"When I started to leave two truck drivers came to the laboratory. I recognized them and let them in. Then I held them up and tied them. I was going to kill them but one of them said he had a wife and some small children, so I took their money and left. I caught a subway for Jersey City. In the spring I came to Detroit and got the job on the farm."

In circuit court the buyer lost. In justice court late Thursday A. F. Beardley, defendant in the case of Frank A. Welch vs. Beardley, was awarded a verdict of \$1 on a counter claim of about \$100 which he had filed against Welch who had brought suit to collect \$85 balance on a \$125 promissory note given to him when he sold a cow to Beardley. The cow involved in this case was declared to be worthless as a milk cow and was returned to its original owner after it had been kept for a few months. Welch sued for a balance of \$85. Beardley's counter claim was for about \$100 in feed.

D. B. Maxfield won a judgment in justice court Wednesday of \$108 against E. E. Gillam in another case resulting from the purchase of a cow. A claim of fraudulent misrepresentation was made in this case when the cow was said to be seven years old and due to be fresh in six weeks while she was actually 12 years old and did not come fresh.

Zasu Pitts is the same never failing source of delight. Her voice shows a bit more life than I have ever heard her express but she is just as funny and deliberate in her movements.

The play has one of the cleverest beginnings that I have seen in a motion picture. It opens with a "purity league" meeting in the home of Mrs. Sabot and what a meeting!

Not only is the play funny but it is true to life for the most part. And in addition to this for a change the vitaphone acts are really funny.

Here is a chance to see how young "Doug" is progressing in the life of his father's profession. PARIS, Feb. 21.—(Friday)—(AP)—Camille Chautemps, president of the radical socialist party, after an all night meeting lasting until 5 a. m. today, completed a cabinet with which he will seek a majority in the chamber of deputies. It will replace that of the retiring premier, Andre Tardieu, who resigned Monday.

Among the principal members of the new government were: Aristide Briand, minister of foreign affairs; Jules Steeg, minister of justice; Albert Sarraut, minister of marine; Rene Bernard, minister of war; Louis Loucheur, minister of labor.

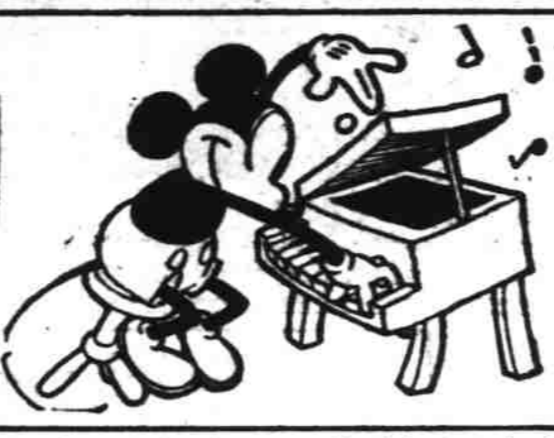
