APPROPRIATION FOR PEN LEGAL

Van Winkle Gives Opinion on Question of Addition to Oregon Prison

The state emergency board has authority to create a deficiency appropriation to meet any emergency, if provided by law, according to a legal opinion handed down by the attorney general here Thursday.

The opinion upsets the previous impression among state officials that an emergency appropriation can be granted only when the original appropriation is exhausted. The opinion was sought by the state board of control in connection with a proposal to construct a new cell block at the state penitentiary costing approximately \$84,000. Whether this improvement is an emergency must be determined by the state emergency board, the attorney general held.

"You set out in your letter," read the attorney general's opinion, "the conditions which will require more room and facilities in the penitentiary during the present year in addition to those already existing and thus far constructed under the provisions of Chapter 410, general laws of Oregon for 1929, for the purpose of making alterations, or new construction either at the former boys training school or the main plant of the penitentiary."

"You show that there is a balance remaining in such appropriation of about \$35,000. You request my opinion whether or not the state board of control has the right, under the law, to ask the emergency board to authorize the creation of a deficiency which would be incurred in the construction of an additional building, after using the present balance of the appropriation."

"It clearly appears that the emergency board is authorized to grant authority to incur a deficiency is a condition requiring either the expenditure of a greater sum than the amount appropriated by the legislative assembly, or the expenditure of moneys not specifically provided by law."

"The requirement for the expenditure of such money must exist by reason of the necessity for discharging a public duty imposed by law. If such duty is imposed and there are no funds or insufficient funds available to meet the expenses of the performance of such duty, then there is an emergency, and under such conditions, the statute authorizes a request to the emergency board for authorization to incur a deficiency."

MOVE TO RECOVER 'EXPENSES' TALKED

Following Tuesday's state supreme court opinion holding unconstitutional a resolution adopted at the 1929 legislative session authorizing the payment of \$5 per day expense money to members, Marion county granges Thursday were investigating the records of the 1927 legislature to determine how many members accepted expense money under a similar resolution adopted at that session.

The check showed that the expense money authorized under the 1927 legislative resolution was refused by Representatives Miller of Umatilla and Settlemier of Marion and Senator Corbett of Multnomah. It was indicated here Thursday that an attempt may be made to recover the expense money paid to legislators under the 1927 resolution.
