Miss Walling suffered a fracture of the leg and other injuries. Her brother was not seriously hurt. Attorneys for Miss Walling said her doctor bill exceeded \$1,600.

In another case the supreme court held that William J. Creson, executor of the will of the late Alice H. Stephenson, was the rightful owner of the property under the will, with the exception of \$10. The opinion was written by Justice Belt and reversed the decree of Judge L. H. McMahan of the Marion county circuit

The will contest was filed by Deborah J. Parrott, daughter of Mrs. Stephenson, who lived at Aurora andto whom the \$10 bequest was made, Mrs. Stephenson died in 1924. She left a will, in which she set out that her daughter had been negligent towards her and had not visited her for more than two years. With the exception of \$10, she left her entire estate to Creson.

Mrs. Parrott alleged that undue influence had been exerted by Creson and that her mother was under an insane delusion.

The supreme court held that Mrs. Stephenson was sane at the time the will wasexecuted. Mrs. Parrott previously had attacked the will left by her father, in which his property was left to Mrs. Stephenson.
