

Stock Market Rallies Strongly to Send Prices Skyward

BEAR FACTION EASILY ROUTED

Over Score of Issues Reach New High Level for This Year, Is Report

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The line of the stock market proved to be decidedly upward in today's stock market. Efforts of the bear faction to unsettle the market during the morning met with scant success. Speculators for the rise took the market in hand during the afternoon and sent shares rushing to cover.

The forward movement was somewhat selective, but more than a score of issues reached high levels for 1930, many gains running from two to six points, with a few even wider. The index of 90 leading stocks rose one and one half points to within less than a point of its high of the year, reached two weeks ago.

Utility and electric equipment stocks were at the forefront of the advance. Westinghouse Electric mounted six points. North American five, American Water Works four, American over and Light and American Telephone, more than three, all to new highs for the year. Several low priced specialties again reflected bullish operations.

Amusement shares continued in demand. Radio, Paramount, and went further into high territory for 1930. Coppers rallied after an early bear drive, American Smelting and Anaconda gaining nearly two points.

U. S. Steel sold off one and one half points, then rallied to close fractionally higher. Simmons was depressed to a new low at \$2 1-8, but rallied to \$2 3-4, off one and one half points, net.

Van Duzer Will Be Speaker at Chamber Confab

H. B. Van Duzer, chairman of the state highway commission, will be the speaker at the Salem chamber of commerce luncheon Sunday noon. His subject will be "State Parks and Scenic Areas," his talk dealing with the program of preserving Oregon's scenic beauties along the highways.

Mr. Van Duzer has been a member of the highway commission since 1923, being reappointed by a republican governor although he is a democrat. He is a graduate of Union university, Tennessee, and came to Oregon in 1898. He was chairman of the production board in 1918, and president of the Portland chamber of commerce from 1920 to 1922. He is vice president of the Isman-Poulsen lumber company.

RIOT BROKEN UP BY POLICE IN OAKLAND

OAKLAND, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Rioting today in front of the state employment office here resulted in injuries to seven persons including a woman and two policemen, arrest of the five rioters, and a police warning that future demonstrations would be broken up on sight.

None of the seven was seriously hurt. The five were charged with rioting, and detained pending posting of \$100 bail each. They were:

Mrs. Anna Robbins, mother of a two year old child; Nicola Seifert, 34; Ed Wong, 37; Archie Brown, 19, and Carl Trippel, 36. Police said all were members of the radical group among the unemployed. It was Mrs. Robbins' second arrest on such a charge this week. She obtained her liberty on bail only last night.

The genesis of today's disturbance was not disclosed in police reports, as the fight started before the police mixed in. Brown, according to reports, was making a "soap box" oration, and some members of the crowd gathered to seek work took exception to his utterances. A free-for-all followed, and police were forced to use their sticks to fight their way through the crowd of several hundred persons to the riot center, that they might make their arrests.

ENVOYS AWAITING ACTION BY FRANCE

LONDON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The news from Paris this afternoon that Andre Tardieu had definitely informed President Doumergue he would form a cabinet gave naval conference circles encouragement that the present dragging phase of disarmament negotiations may be ended a day or two earlier than expected.

The supposition is that the French delegation may be able to return to London by the middle of next week. It is admitted everywhere no rapid progress can be made until the French rejoin the four delegations awaiting them.

Meanwhile the Americans and Japanese will continue their efforts, as they did yesterday and today, to reach a compromise agreement on cruisers, submarines and other disputed points. The only meeting today occurred when Ambassador Matsumura called upon Senator Reed to clear up points of yesterday's discussion.

Prime Minister MacDonald convened the United Kingdom delegates at Downing street this noon, and with that the conference work was just about completed until Monday.

DR. SNOOK IS SLAIN IN CHAIR

University Professor Meets Death Calmly After All Appeals Beaten

led by three guards. His eyes were red—as if he had cried after his last meeting with his wife. He walked with firm step and head erect. As the two chair guards took him by the arm, the doctor stepped forward briskly and sat down in the death chair.

He was accompanied into the room by two ministers, Rev. Isaac Miller, of the King Avenue M. E. church, his pastor, and the Rev. K. E. Wall, prison chaplain. The death house was crowded.

Two guards took the doctor by the arms and strapped him in the death chair. Another adjusted the mask. And a second before the current was turned on, Rev. Mr. Miller intoned in solemn voice "The Lord Be With You."

Current shut off After Three Contacts
A second later the chief deputy passed the signal to three unnamed guards and the doctor surged under the first electric contact. After the three contacts, the first at 7:05 1/2 p. m., and the last at 7:09 1/2 p. m., the current was shut off. For three minutes five physicians waited. Headed by Dr. George W. Keil, the prison doctor, the physicians examined Dr. Snook. The prison physician was unsatisfied, and thrice he returned to the chair to place his sensitive instrument against the condemned man's chest. Finally at 7:11 p. m. he stepped back and said: "Gentlemen, sufficient current has passed through this man's body to cause death."

Snook said nothing as he entered the death house. His lips were clasped tight and he did not open them once. He gazed fixedly at the witnesses until the death mask was set in place. Shortly before the execution, Mrs. Helen Snook, wife of the condemned man, who broke bread with her husband at his last meal on earth, was led from the prison by two friends. She seemed in a state of collapse and was able to walk only with the aid of one of her escorts.

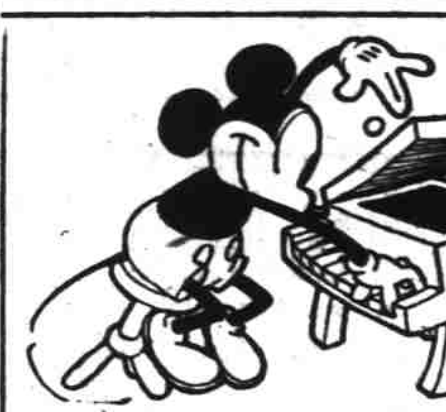

SANTO DOMINGO GETS NEW HEAD

Provisional President Named To Take Over Reins of Government

SANTO DOMINGO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The governmental forces of President Horacio Vasquez and the insurgent leaders of the movement against him, with the apparent approval of the American minister, today agreed on a provisional president for the demerit republic. He is General Raul Estrella Urena, one of the insurgent leaders.

At noon President Vasquez, against whose continuation in office during the presidential elections the insurgent movement started, signed a decree appointing General Estrella Urena secretary of state for the interior. According to the constitution, this member of the cabinet acts as president in the absence of the president and of the vice president.

At the same time President Vasquez asked the national assembly to permit him to leave the republic and stay in a foreign country. He gave ill health as his reason for making such a request before his term of office was over.

Estrella Urena, who is a lawyer by profession, led the insurgent troops into Santo Domingo two days ago and carried on negotiations with General Rafael Trujillo, loyal commander of Port Ozama. He was minister of justice and instruction in the Dominican cabinet in 1916 but resigned six months later and was appointed minister to France.

CABINET FORMED SOON

PARIS, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Andre Tardieu today informed President Doumergue that he was certain to have his new cabinet before parliament at 3 p. m. next Thursday.
