

"Old Timers" Back for 40th Woodburn Church Reunion

ALL-DAY USED FOR GATHERING

History Recounted During Past Years; One Left of Original 'Aid'

WOODBURN, March 3.—The first Presbyterian church of this city and the Ladies' Aid of that church observed their 40th anniversary at an all-day session in the church Sunday.

There were 150 people out and many of the "old timers" who attended church here some years ago came back to renew old acquaintances. Sunday school was held at 10 with morning devotional services at 11. At 1:00 a dinner was served and at 2:00 a program was presented.

The church was organized in 1889 with 12 members with the aid of the Home Mission Society by Rev. W. D. P., the first pastor of the church was Rev. J. E. Day. In 1893, Rev. M. S. Riddle and Rev. F. Edwards were stated supply ministers and in 1895, Rev. T. Brouillette became pastor. Rev. N. H. Jones was pastor in 1896 and was succeeded by Rev. Robert A. Smith in 1898. The ministers since that time have been: Rev. George A. McKinley, 1900; Rev. J. M. Anderson, 1902; Rev. Louis M. Combs, 1903; Rev. J. A. P. McGaw, stated supply; Rev. L. S. Mochel, 1907; Rev. T. Vincent, 1910; Rev. O. C. Weller, 1913; Rev. C. F. Reed, stated supply, 1916; Rev. E. N. Quist, 1917; Rev. R. W. Acker, 1919. The present minister is Rev. Henry G. Hanson who has been with this church since 1927. Mrs. E. H. Cowles was the first organist in the church.

The Ladies' Aid began during the early history of the church with eight members, all having passed away except one, Molly Vorhees, who is now a member of the Aid. The first officers were Mrs. F. A. Ford, president; Mrs. J. E. Day, vice president; Mrs. J. Vorhees, secretary; Mrs. Molly Vorhees, treasurer. At present, there are 75 members in the Aid and the officers are Mrs. Henry Layman, president; Mrs. Harold Aspinwall, vice president; Mrs. Jack Hanson, secretary; Mrs. O. W. Noyes, treasurer. The president, Mrs. Layman, has been president of the Aid for the past six years and has been secretary and treasurer of the Sunday school for 26 years.

Rev. O. C. Weller preached the sermon at the morning service and the special music for the service consisted of an anthem by Mrs. Ruth Holt and Mrs. Jack Hansen, Mrs. J. M. Richards, accompanist. Rev. L. S. Mochel presided in the absence of the pastor. Rev. Henry Hanson, who was unexpectedly called away.

After a social hour from 12:00 to 1:00, a delicious dinner was served in the basement by the Ladies' Aid. Rev. Acker offered the blessing at the table. The feature of the dinner was the lovely birthday cake, baked by Mrs. O. W. Noyes which was cut by Mrs. H. Overton. Before the cake was cut, the twin sons of Rev. Acker, Richard and Winfield blew out all but two of the candles on the cake.

Mrs. Overton presided over the afternoon program which opened with a hymn by the congregation. Rev. L. S. Mochel read the scripture selection for the afternoon and Rev. Acker offered prayer. S. W. Maupin sang a vocal solo with the chorus by the choir. Rev. Graftious pastor of the Presbyterian church of Gervais talked and Rev. Acker and Rev.
