

Revolt Is Affecting All India

Demonstrations A r e Reported Mostly in North

Resistance to English Government Is Advocated

NEW DELHI, March 12. — (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi's historic of the campaign for civil disobedience began today from the leaders' headquarters at Ahmedabad, and tonight demonstrations that were unusually orderly were reported from various parts of upper India.

At Aslali, the first halt on the long journey Ghandi spoke to a large crowd. He defied the British government to arrest him and warned his followers they must be prepared "for the worst, even death, in plans for defiance of the salt tax." Production of salt in defiance of the government monopoly is the first disobedience

**Sympathizers March
Miles Along Route**

At the beginning of the march it was reported that thousands of men and women accompanied Gandhi for several miles, rich and poor marching side by side while thousands lined the road side.

Most of them dropped out eventually and Gandhi continued with 80,000 more.

During Asa Keyes' incarceration in the Los Angeles jail he and A. Shuster, deputy jailer became fast friends. He is pictured bidding jailer goodbye. Keyes will share prison life at San Quentin with many men he convicted during his long terms of office in Los Angeles.

The British troops are on the alert for trouble. Thus far no action has been taken although Gandhi's arrest soon is generally expected.

The only "incident" of the day occurred in Bombay, where 2,000 schoolboys clashed with the police. Only one was arrested and he was released later.

Demonstrations in other places were mainly limited to hoisting the nationalist flag and making speeches.

A public demonstration in New Delhi, organized by the Youth League, passed off peacefully with little or no extra police precautions being taken.

At Rawalpindi the president of the Youth League was arrested and charged with sedition, but business went on as usual.
