

HEALTH BOARD VIEWS CAMPS

Preparations for Approaching
Tourist Traffic is
Urged in State

Spring days are already luring the wanderer from place to place, and because it is so, the weekly bulletin of the state board of health is devoted to tourist camps. What the state board says follows:

In preparation for the rapidly approaching out-of-doors season, tourist camps should be placed in a sanitary condition and camp-ground owners should have their camps ready to receive the traveling public. Everything should be done to protect the health of the tourist. This means that an unquestionable water supply should be provided; cabins should be thoroughly cleaned and sunned, and the grounds should be raked and all waste materials incinerated.

There are many things in the way of equipment that add to the convenience and comfort of the tourist. Such equipment is really necessary for the operation of a successful camp. A good water supply, adequate toilet facilities, good drainage, and effective garbage disposal are the requisites of a modern tourist camp.

The practice of stopping overnight at tourist camps is growing, and this year tourists travel promises to be greater than ever. It is the duty of the campground owners to see that the tourist is provided with really comfortable roadside camps that are inviting. Good camps are always full and reservations usually have to be made in advance. The essentials of a good camp are general cleanliness, and modern conveniences such as adequate and convenient toilet facilities, hot and cold water, shower baths, laundry, kitchen and dining rooms. A camp should always be able to show a clean bill of health. The attendants should be clothed in clean washable uniforms.

Scribe Finds Dog Pound Populated With Canines Awaiting Owners' Arrival

Every dog might have his day, but out at the city's dog pound, it's an owner every dog seeks. Right now, it seems to be a case of owner disowning dog; and it is a safe bet if Mr. Canine could be interviewed in the matter, he'd tell some good ones on the man or woman who fussed over and petted him until the annual license loomed on the family budget.

The city dog catcher, who is Carl Radke, has been more of a business than anyone would suspect the past month, rounding up dogs, answering complaints about the other fellow's dog and in general keep peace between the canine and human element.

The reason for the extra heavy demands on his time is two-fold: First, as intimated, some people are beginning to discard their dogs because it's about time to deposit a few coins with the city for him; and second, because garden time is here and dogs have a habit of playing havoc with the best planned gardens.

Radke has tended wandering dogs for nearly four years now, which means he has seen some good dogs come and go. The "go" when it does not mean return to the owner or a gift to some lover of dogs, means entrance to the canine's Elysian fields via the gas route.

In case the reader has never visited the dog pound, which is located in the city barns on Ferry and 13th, one finds there a square room, half of which is partitioned off into four pens, each with its own wire gate; at one end of the room is a large concrete tank with a tell-tale gas pipe attached. Up to late yesterday afternoon, only two dogs, one a large lean bird dog and the other a good looking shepherd, had things all their own way at the pound. In the 10 previous days, 11 dogs went to their last sleep in the corner tank. And by the way, the

big shephrd dog is waiting for a farmer owner, says Radke, intimating that although his time is up, he would rather see him running happy and free on some farm in the county.

Dogs of all kinds, sizes and makes reach this home for strays. Each is held at the pound for at least five days, and advertised each day. In case the owner does not appear at the end of that time, the dog catcher may use his discretion in giving each way or turning on the gas. Occasionally a dog is sold, with the understanding that the original owner may sometime show up.

In the matter of keeping peace between persons and dogs, the man who holds the key to the pounds finds plenty of use for diplomacy. Now and then he has to resort to swearing out a warrant to establish harmony; but he says in the four years he has been on the job, he has managed to handle comparatively few of them. Of course, the city's dog boarders are fed regularly, with one of the meat markets saving scraps for them, and the city buying bread. The city, too, buys straw for their bedding. Radke estimated that he handles 350 dogs each year, about 150 of which have to be killed. Only one in every 10, he further estimates, is bailed out.

And Radke tells this on the dog catcher: "If I don't get the dog, I'm after the first or second time, it's just that much harder for me. For after that, even the dogs get wise to what I'm after."
