# Economic Advisory Board For Oregon Appointed by Governor Here Yesterday

Appointment of members of the Oregon economic advisory board, which was authorized by a resolution adopted at the economic conference held in Portland a few weeks ago, was announced by Governor Norblad here Wednesday. The board will consist of 29 members, or nine more members than suggested at the time the resolution was adopted.

In increasing the membership of the advisory board, Governor Norblad explained that he was desirous that all parts of the state should be represented, and that every outstanding industry in the state should have a part in the proceedings. The board will be permanent and will report its findings from time to time to the economic conference.

The purpose of the advisory board is to conduct a general survey of the industries of Oregon, with a view of speeding up industrial development and providing employment for men and women at all times of the year. The plan is in line with the suggestion of President Hoover, and was said to have received the support of virtually all of the outstanding industries in the state.

Governor Norblad said he would call special attention of the advisory board to the fact that Pacific coast manufacturers and producers have been slighted for many years in connection with the awarding of government contracts for supplies and materials. This was called to Governor Norblad's attention by Representative Korpell of the third congressional district.

Under the present system of awarding government contracts it is provided that all supplies shall be delivered in Washington regardless of whether they are used in the eastern states or on the Pacific coast. As a result Pacific coast bidders on these contracts are obliged to include the long freight haul in their bids which is discriminatory in favor of the eastern manufacturers.

Governor Norblad will ask the advisory board to confer with federal officials to determine if it is possible to have government contracts awarded on a basis of local production. He is also planning to include in their proposals the high freight charge from points of consignment to Washington. This would place the western manufacturer on an equal basis with the eastern bidder.

"Under the present system of bidding," read a statement issued by Governor Norblad, "bids are

based upon factory cost plus the freight charges from the factories to departmental buildings at Washington. Thereafter the articles are shipped during the year on departmental orders and quotations to all parts of the United States, including the Pacific coast states.

"The effect of this procedure not only aids the eastern factories and merchants near Washington to obtain the annual contracts but enables them to place their products at government expense in the Pacific coast area. To illustrate the injustice resulting from the present method the following is a hypothetical case.

"Assuming that the cost of producing an article in a factory in Baltimore and Portland to exactly the same. The freight rate from Baltimore to Washington is 25 cents per 100 pounds, while the freight rate from Portland to Washington is \$1. The Baltimore factory under the present method will underbid the Portland factory to the extent of 75 cents in each article. In other words a subsidy of 75 cents is being granted to the successful bidder.

"The government's policy of awarding contracts has prevented the Pacific coast merchants and manufacturers from entering into any of these contracts, and a survey of governmental departments at Washington indicates that not a single Pacific coast manufacturer's name appears in the list of those who received contracts through the treasury department."

In making up his list of members of the advisory board Governor Norblad included representatives of both the university of Oregon and Oregon State college. Both of these institutions were said to have funds which can be used in conducting the survey. Other funds will be necessary, however, in case the survey is complete and extends to all parts of the state.

Mr. Miller declared proper supervision of this land would result in a revenue of \$1,000,000 to the state, and that its sale should net the state \$20,000,000.

# HIGHWAY GROUP REQUESTS BIDS

## Bridge Over Little Pudding River Near Hazel Green Among Projects

Bids for the construction of approximately 140 miles of highway and a number of bridges will be considered at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland Thursday, March 27.

The several projects for which bids will be received follow: Clackamas county—Multnomah county line-Owego section of the Pacific highway, .93 mile of grading.

Clatsop county—Cannon Beach Junction-Neaham Summit section of Roosevelt coast highway. Furnishing of 12,000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance and betterment purposes.

Douglas county—Tahkenitch-Gardiner section of Roosevelt coast highway, 3.17 miles of grading. Scottsburg-Buchard creek section of Umpqua highway, 4.43 miles of grading.

Grant county—Mountain Rest-Little Beech creek section of the Pendleton-John Day highway, Long Creek-Hamilton section of Market road No. 1, and Mount Vernon-Biggs ranch section of Market road No. 2, including 24.5 miles of surfacing.

Lane county—Nimrod-Belknap Springs section of McKenzie highway, 21 miles of resurfacing and furnishing materials for maintenance purposes.

Malheur county—Tunnel-Harper section of Central Oregon highway, 13.31 miles of grading. Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties—The Dalles oiling project. Construction of 16 miles of bituminous macadam wearing surface, resoling 23.3 miles of old macadam, and application of non-skid treatment on 48.2 miles of pavement.

Cosco county—Bridge over Larson Slough on the Roosevelt coast highway, 4 miles north of North Bend.

Douglas county—Bridge and two culverts on the Umpqua highway to be let in one contract.

Bridge over Wells creek, 19 miles east of Reedsport. Culvert over Golden Creek 19 1/2 miles east of Reedsport. Culvert over Burchard creek, 21 1/2 miles east of Reedsport.

Klamath county—Bridge over Klamath river on the Green Springs highway at Klamath Falls.

Lincoln county—Construction of ferry slip and approaches thereon to the Roosevelt coast highway at the north side of Alsea Bay.

Marion county—Bridge over Little Pudding river on market road No. 52, near Hazel Green.

# List Is Led By Whooping Cough, Word

Whooping cough, with 50 cases, led the communicable diseases in Marion county for the month of February, according to the report made by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, at the regular monthly meeting of the Marion county health unit held last night at the Salem health center.

The report showed a total of 156 cases of contagion, 36 of which were mumps and 51 chickenpox. Seven cases of pneumonia, six of influenza and four each of scarlet fever and bronchial pneumonia were also reported.

Remainder of the disease was divided: diphtheria, measles and tuberculosis. Remainder of the disease was divided: diphtheria, measles and tuberculosis, three each; smallpox and amebic dysentery, two each; typhoid, venereal diseases, erysipelas, Vincent's angina, one each.

For the first two months of the year, mumps and whooping cough have appeared most frequently, at 84 and 85 times, respectively. There were 60 reported cases of chickenpox in January and February.

# STRAWBERRY CROP OUTLOOK IS BRIGHT

"The strawberry crop for the coming season looks good, but the loganberry and black cap prospects are in bad shape," declared Sam Van Trump, county horticultural inspector, yesterday in commenting upon the crop predictions for Marion county berry growers. "I might also add that there has been a good deal of injury to the evergreen vines, too," volunteered the inspector.

"The weather is not favorable for the cane crops and unless there is more moisture it is doubtful that the logans, black caps and evergreens will be of much value this spring. Usually when there has been some damage done to the canes, they will revive if there is considerable warm rain during the month of March. This gives the cambium layer with the cane an opportunity to build up and not dry out, as is being done during the present weather," Van Trump pointed out.
