ASTORIA YOUTH IS AGGRESSIVE

Clinches Numerous Between Two Scrappers at Armory Here

Persistent although not spectacularly successful attack on the part of Jimmie Anderson, aggressive little thunderbolt from Astoria, won for him a decision over Frankie Monroe of Monroe, in Wednesday night's main event at the armory, Anderson thus gaining the advantage after 22 successive rounds this pair has fought recently.

BULLDOGS HAVE GRAD PRACTICE

Good Material on Hand Despite Loss of Ten Veteran Players

WOODBURN, March 12.—(Special)—Of interest to many of the high school coaches and players on the football eleven throughout the valley is the material that is turning out at Woodburn high for spring football practice.

In spite of the fact that all but one of the undefeated 1929 eleven are graduating seniors, the Woodburn team will have a strong nucleus of reserve material from which to build another championship team. Virgil Dirksen, guard during '29 is the only one of the first string to return and may be sufficient to fill the center berth which Royal Hastie will be unable to take, being barred by the 20 year age limit.

Harold Gustafsen at halfback showed a great deal of promise during the 1929 season and will undoubtedly hold that position on the first string for 1930. Gustafsen's main drawback is his size but if he puts on weight during the summer vacation he should be a threat to any opposition.

The most promising material for the squad will be found in George Ostrum who seems to be a natural football player and shines in the halfback position. Harold Scholer, the last of the four famous Woodburn high school athletes in that family will probably clinch the quarter position and has already displayed his ability to run back punts and manage the team in the '29 season.

Ray Scott who is a letterman and who was shifted to the line position this year will fill another gap and Frank Bartos, brother of Charles Bartos of this year's squad, has displayed exceptional ability in the tackle position.

Tilgher Barstad and Lawrence Koch have shown that they can wear the blue and white to advantage and although Koch is only a freshman this year he will undoubtedly make a name for himself next year. Fred Thomas, a sophomore, has more of the much needed size and should do something for his school next year on the gridiron.

The positions at end are presenting a little difficulty but Kenner Gillanders and Gordon Klamp should be able to hold down these positions.

Ralph Nelson, Kenneth Evans and Kenneth Battleson, sophomores, have displayed the Bulldog fight and will be heard of in a big way before they graduate. Ed Oberst and Charles Cammack, two promising and ambitious freshmen will also play a part in the football history of Woodburn high before they leave.
