lines, like drug stores, grocery stores, etc.

At the same time, all factories, large and small, are being canvassed by the same enumerators, and the mines and quarries where there are any. This work is also new for the regular decennial census year. It goes without saying that this is the largest undertaking of the kind ever attempted by any country.

Work in Salem to be finished April 2.

It is hoped that this census may be finished before April 2, in Salem, before the general census of population and agriculture is started.

The men who will do the work in Salem are four who have finished in Polk and the territory in Marion county outside of this city so they should be able to work fast and cover the city districts in the time expected. The four men are as follows:

John C. Tibbitts of Salem, southwest portion, west of Winter and south of State.

Britt Aspinwall of Brooks, northwest Salem, north of State and west of Winter.

Andrew G. Miller of Aurora, southeast Salem, south of State and east of Winter.

Ezra A. Rhoden of Salem, northeast Salem, north of State and east of Winter.

The work in Salem would have been started several days ago but the supplies needed did not arrive until Monday.

Last night at the Grand theatre a young man of excellent bearing, good looking, and I discovered later, very serious about his chosen profession, presented a check of another to the establishment of a large audience, which sat part of the time too amazed at what had happened to even applaud—and at other times applause rang, and all in compliment to Virgil.

After the show was over I had a chat with this young man backstage among the littered paraphernalia which went to make up the stage setting of last night and again for tonight. One of the outstanding pieces of this paraphernalia to me was a rough box and a coffin which had just been delivered from a local undertakers shop and in which the young man will be locked tonight by a committee of six men from the audience and from which he will make his escape in three minutes—the time that he is promised at least and I am convinced that he will do it.

Talking with him while I was there was another young magician—said the youngest one—you are the only man in the United States who is doing that with the rough box are you not? "Yes," admitted Virgil, "but of course there is 'so-and-so' and 'so-and-so' who are doing it in a bit different form." It was all Greek to me but it gave me a new respect for magicians and especially for Virgil.

How did he get interested in such work? Well, first perhaps it was that there were three tricks handed down in his family and with which he was fooled when he was a very small boy—far back as he can remember. Then when he was six a magician came to town and Virgil and his little playmate who is now an amateur magician living near Seattle, went to see the show. From then on magic was life. While other children played Virgil and his playmates studied the "black art."

Through grade school, high school and four years lacking six months in the University of Oregon Virgil kept up his study. He majored in dramatics and played in the regular school dramatic company.

All this time he was making his school money with his "black art" and just six months before graduation came an offer to go into vaudeville; it was too tempting and he went. Since that time he has been improving his art and now has his own show with a group of five people. At the last national convention of magicians in Ohio Virgil was one of three young magicians among 3000 gathered, to be mentioned as coming foremost magicians of the time. He is only 23 years old.

He has some interests on the outside in a business way, because he says, it is not well to keep all one's eggs in the same basket even though that basket is the joy of his heart and the hobby which gives him the only real pleasure that he knows.

"What would I do if I ceased to be a magician?" He looked very serious, then said very seriously, "I am not so sure that I would want to go on doing anything. To me it is the only real joy. I work long hours, and find my recreation in planning for more complex work in my art." And looking at him after having watched him on the stage and talk later behind stage I was forced to believe him.

BOUNDARY CHANGE FOR WARDS TALKED

An ordinance proposing to change the boundaries of the second and fourth wards in Salem, to coincide with changes being made in the precinct boundaries, was introduced at Monday night's council meeting. It will come up for final disposition at the next meeting.

An effort was made to pass it under suspension of the rules, but this was voted down. The change would take away part of the area of the fourth ward, and Alderman Purvis, who will probably be a candidate to succeed himself in that ward, facetiously objected that it "would rob him of his strongest support."

Alderman O'Hara suggested that the council take up the question of readjusting all ward boundaries, contending that the fifth ward polled twice as many votes as the third ward in the last election. This proposal was countered by Alderman Kowitz with a suggestion that action be delayed until after the census is completed.
